### Esquesing calls Burlington fire bluff

proposal for a new auxiliary fire

station at Kilbride. During the regular meeting Monday night, Reeve George Currie denied that Milton Fire Area volunteers are neglecting north Burlington and said he doubted if residents there are prepared to foot the cost of their own protection.

One Burlington spokesman is reported to have threatened withdrawal of the area from the Milton district, if volunteers could not be trained in Kilbride.

"I'm prepared to call their bluff," declared the Reeve. "Burlington has been trying to jump the gun for years. They want all the good stuff and leave

Esquesing Council is standing us to cover the top of the firm against a recent Burlington mountain."

He went on to suggest that under the original contract, Burlington has the right to withdraw from the fire area, but they have to withdraw completely. This would mean an expansion of their facilities and a rise in taxes to the residents who would benefit.

"If they pull out, Milton isn't going to lose much," concluded Reeve Currie. "Milton answered 19 calls in Burlington all last year. It would be less than a half a mill difference to us."

The showdown will come Wednesday night when representatives from Burlington, Oakville, Esquesing, Nassagaweya and Milton meet in Milton.

An inflatable "Fabri-dam' may be used in the construction of the Scotch Block reservoir, engineer M. Lewis reported to the Halton Region Conservation Authority executive Thursday

The rubber membrane, an experimental product of the Firestone Co., has been in use in some dams in the U.S.A. Its producers estimate it will last about 20 years before needing replacement; although repairs can be made to minor holes in it in the meantime.
