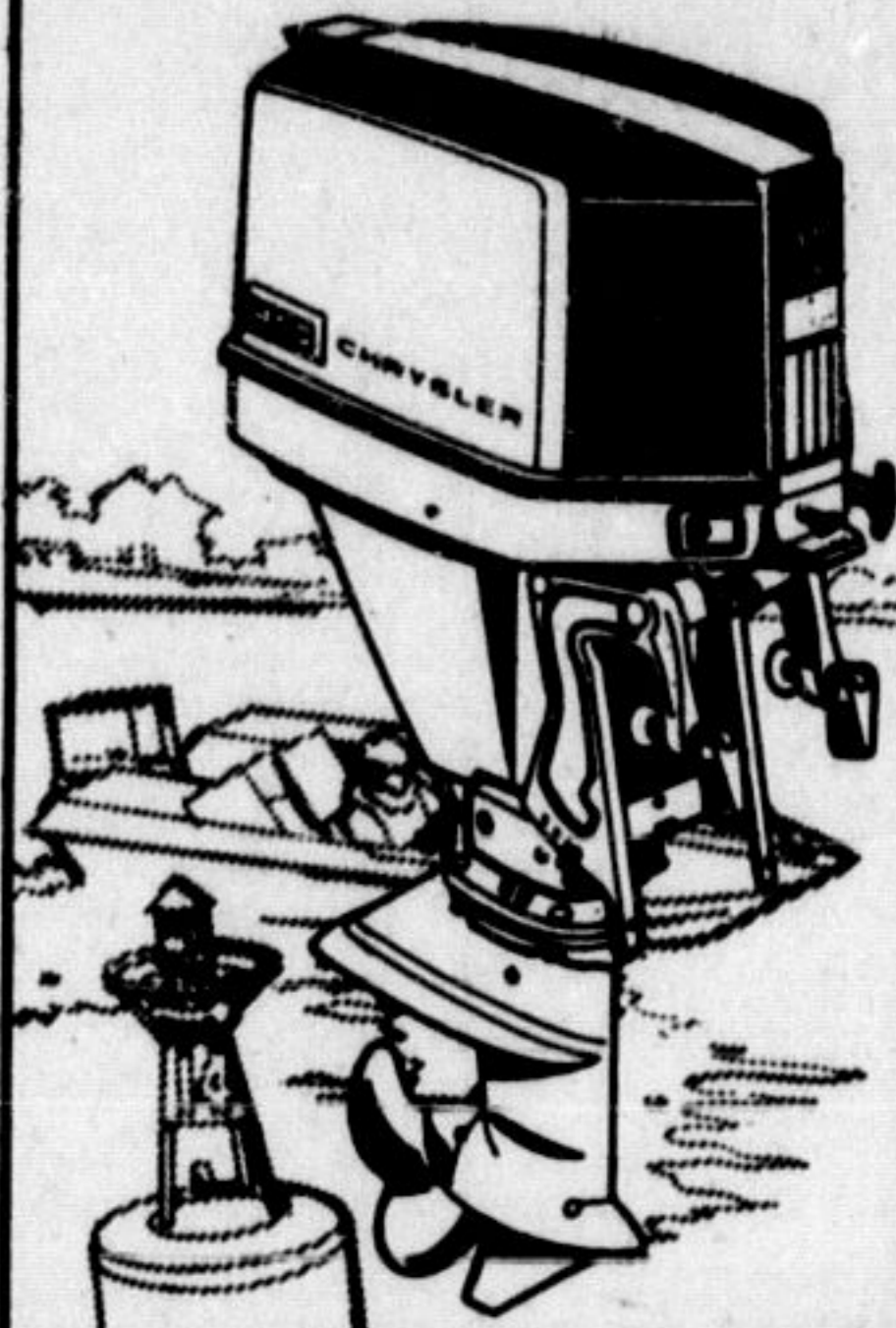
Oakville did the rest of the scoring and won the game in the bottom of the fourth.

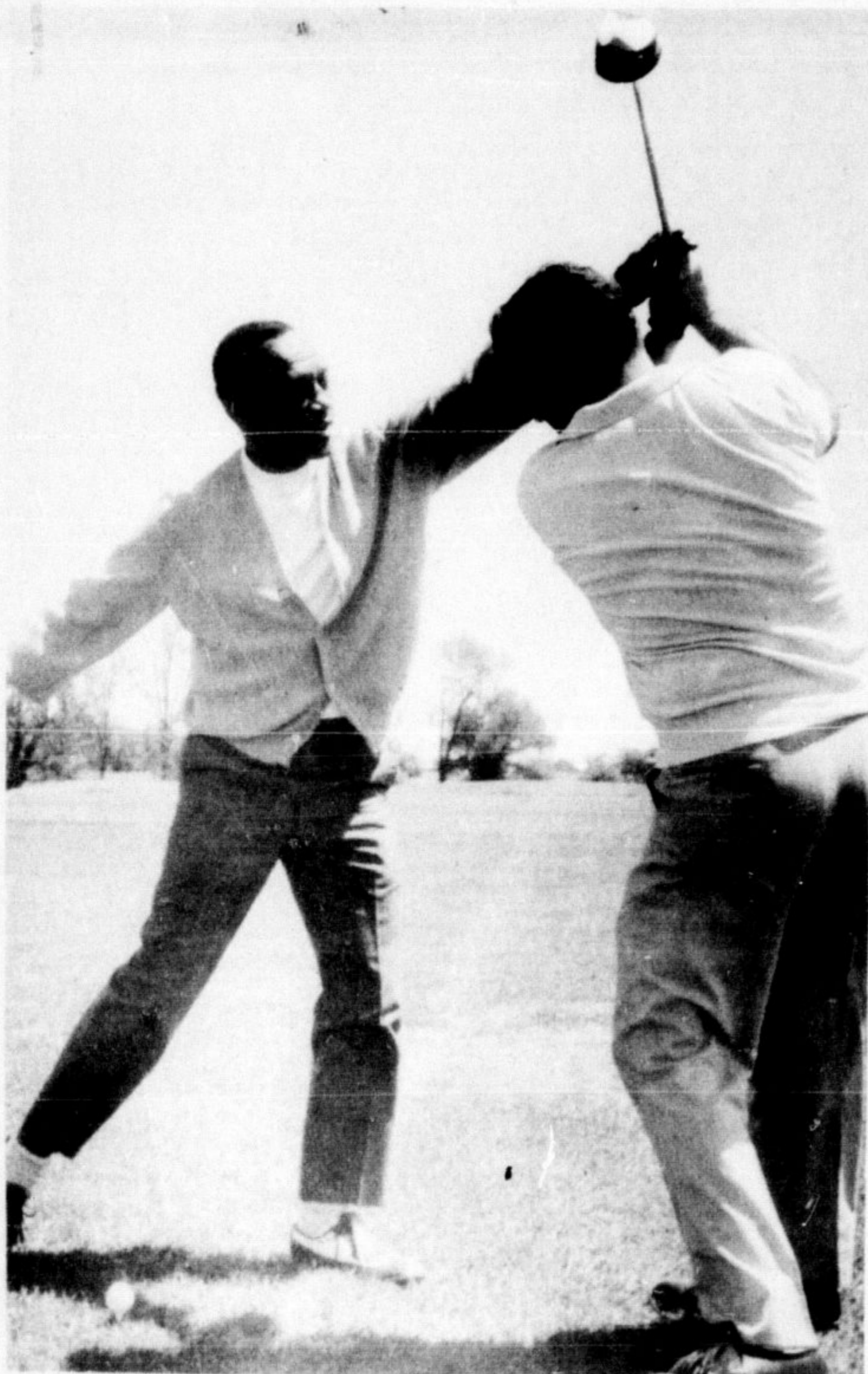
