100 show for lacrosse clinic

Nearly 100 of all ages turned up at the Milton Arena Saturday morning for the first lacrosse clinic to be held in the area.

The clinic, sponsored by the Milton Recreation Committee, was instructed by Denny Peterson of Oakville who is a referee in the professional Eastern Lacrosse Association. The morning and afternoon sessions included films and

practical instruction on lacrosse. He pointed out the basic stick positions used in the game as well as basic playing positions and gave the boys some examples of famous NHL hockey players, such as goalie Jacques Plante, who have tried lacrosse.

Plante, he said, was brought in to help publicize the sport of lacrosse in the Montreal area and he was naturally put in nets. The NHL goalie, according to Mr. Peterson, was not used to the smaller net and different playing positions used in lacrosse and, after having 22 goals scored on him during the game, Plante was reported to have said in a frustrated tone of voice, "I quit."
