

Fate of grade eights will be decided later

Esquing pupils in grade seven who want to finish their grade eight at Stewarttown will be considered when a full bus schedule is presented to the County Board of Education in July.

Boundary changes in the attendance areas of schools east and west of Acton affected some Esquing pupils who began attendance at the Senior School at Stewarttown this year.

Trustee W. Lawson asked they be given the opportunity to complete their grade eight year at Stewarttown even if it required some additional expense in transportation.

Assistant Director D. S. Lawless asked approval of the boundary changes to permit finalization of the transportation report. When it is presented, he suggested, the board could consider extensions at that time.

A move to have the administrative staff provide a report on the alternate full day kindergarten attendance compared with the half day attendance was defeated.

Trustee Lawson noted Esquing was presently operating on the alternate full day program and while it was in operation, it would seem ideal to

contrast it with the half day attendance.

The Board had previously ruled Esquing pupils would revert to the half day attendance common throughout the county.

Trustee T. Watson suggested it was not wise to ask for such a report at this time when so many important things remained to be done in preparation for the September term.

The request for the report was defeated with Trustees Lawson, Gooding and Edwards supporting.

Pedestrian, 8, struck by car

A pedestrian, eight-year-old Michael Brown of R. R. 3, Milton, was injured Saturday afternoon when struck by a car while walking on Highway 25 near his home, Milton O.P.P. report.

The boy suffered a cut chin and a possible broken right wrist in the collision. The accident happened across the road from his home, the Ontario Deaf Mission Farm on Highway 25 just north of Five Sideroad. Barrie Sales, 49, of Port Credit was the driver of the car.

Milton Council Briefs

Meeting in committee and council Monday, members of Milton Council:

Minister rejects proposal board issues own tax bills

A county proposal that boards of education issue their own tax bills drew little encouragement from the Minister of Education and a suggested meeting with the Minister on education costs in Halton was rejected.

In a letter to county council the Deputy Minister of Education suggested that since the provision of educational services "comes within the purview and responsibility of the Halton County Board of Education... you address a request to the chairman or secretary of the board for its consideration".

"They've very neatly passed the buck", Reeve F. Oakes observed.

Deputy Reeve Mrs. A. MacArthur, herself a teacher, suggested one of the problems is that the "county bought a bill of goods with too many people in the hierarchy". She suggested this might be where the Board could be asked to review its budget. "It's ridiculous the number of people we have at the top."

Reeve G. Gallagher suggested with today's data processing systems it should be no problem for the board to issue its own tax bills.

* Learned reading of water meters had started to be completed for the introduction of water meter billing July 1. First accounts will go out at the first of August. A few installations are yet to be completed and it was reported additional requests for remote reading installations were being received.

* Agreed to register a tax certificate on one large property owner whose taxes were three years in arrears and accounted for half the town's outstanding taxes. Notice of the proposed action was to be given.

* Appointed Andy Keilty to the Committee of Adjustment to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Fred Massee who was moving from Milton.

* Appointed Wilf Penson as trench inspector and as weed inspector.

* Rescinded a resolution objecting to a land separation from Edwin Bailey when it was clarified that the necessary land for future road widening had been provided.

* Authorized the works superintendent to call tenders for the town's gasoline, furnace fuel, diesel fuel and motor oils and greases.

* Deferred action on a proposal to have the planner prepare a development plan for the north community designated on the proposed official plan.

* Deferred action on a proposed procedure for handling plans of subdivision, and applications for amendments to the zoning by-law, until the official plan and zoning by-law have been approved.

* Learned a meeting of the council and planning board would be held Thursday to finalize jointly any adjustments in the proposed official plan so it may be adopted at the council meeting on July 7.

Vote of confidence given Rud Whiting

Halton M.P. Rud Whiting received a unanimous vote of confidence from the executive of the Halton and Halton East Liberal Association earlier this week. Whiting this week celebrates the first anniversary of his election to parliament.

"It was no platitude," said David Butler, Association president. "In our opinion and the opinion of many voters in this riding, Rud is one of the most dedicated and hardest-working members of any of the representatives from anywhere in Canada."

"He works long hours in Ottawa during the week and then comes home on weekends to put in more long and hard

hours. You couldn't ask for more dedication and effort from anyone," Butler said.

Butler said Whiting will be honored at a dinner-dance which the Association is planning for the fall.

At the same meeting, the Association executive also passed resolutions:

* To write Prime Minister Pierre Elliott Trudeau requesting the allocation of funds for research facilities for backbenchers;

* To write the prime minister requesting tax deduction benefits for persons who financially support political parties.

Harry Isham director for retarded workshop

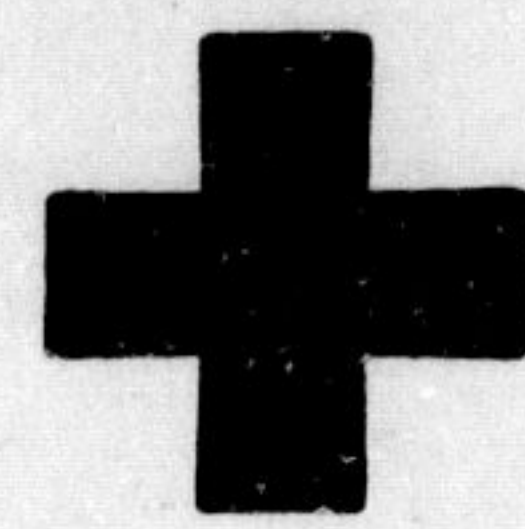
Harry Isham of R. R. 6, Milton, director of the A.R.C. Industries workshop for adult retardates at Hornby, died suddenly in St. Michael's College Hospital, Toronto, on June 14.

Mr. Isham has been active in the local association for the mentally retarded for several years. He was president of North Halton Association for the Mentally Retarded in 1967 and was chairing the 1969 Flowers of Hope fund-raising campaign at the time of his death. For three years he was adult services chairman of N.H.A.M.R.

Born May 4, 1910 at Birmingham, England, he had 23 years of service with the Royal Navy as chief engine-room artificer, including service during the second war. He came to Canada in 1956, lived at Etobicoke, then moved to Milton six years ago. Mr. Isham was an active member of the Royal Canadian Legion, Branch

Colin of Dartmouth, N.S., Russell of Newmarket, Gareth of Perth, Australia, and Richard of Milton. Two sisters Grace and Nell also survive at Birmingham, England.

Less than 100 Halton farmers took part in an advance poll held Thursday in Milton. Tuesday's vote, timed to coincide with the province-wide balloting, was held from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. at Boyne Centre, Brookville Hall, Stewarttown Hall and Lowville United Church.
