Michael Coudine, Paul Stover, Laurie Stevenson and Mr. Shier. Willing workers helped clean


up after the party. The pupils enjoyed the happy get-together and expressed appreciation to Mr. Kobzey the principal and all teachers for planning the event.

"It's stupid to have the road committee propose 22 sideroad from concessions three to five as desirable county road", Deputy Reeve Ted Tyler of Acton charged at the monthly meeting of Halton County


Will teach, show paintings at charity fund "paint-in"


