Soloist Joan Beaty joins youth band European tour

Joan Beaty of Milton is anxiously looking forward to a busy July this year as she heads overseas as soloist with the 60-piece Ontario Youth Concert Band. The band, conducted by noted musician George Houslander will play 11 concerts and take part in several TV and radio broadcasts in England, Germany and Switzerland between July 1 and July 31.

Miss Beaty, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Maurice C. Beaty of R. R. 4, Milton, is taking her Bachelor of Music in Performance at the Faculty of Music, University of Toronto. She is well known locally for her vocal solo work.

Two years ago she went along as soloist when Mr. Houslander took the Saltfleet High School concert band on a seven week tour of seven European countries, and she enjoyed the trip immensely. When the bandmaster held auditions in January for this year's Ontario Youth Concert Band she was again selected as the soloist. She specializes in classical music and can sing in several languages.

The trip is sponsored by the Ontario Government. Most of the bandmen are grade 13 and university students with a varied background in music. Rehearsals began Friday in Toronto.

Their itinerary leaves the concert band members plenty of time for tours and sightseeing. There are several special dinners and receptions being held in their honor. In some cities they will billet in schools but billets in private homes have been arranged wherever possible.

They leave Toronto June 30 to fly to England. They visit Solihull, London, Worthing and Eastbourne in England, then

Plan TV programs

Church airs youth problems

Grace Anglican Church in Milton and other churches in the Niagara Diocese are plunging boldly into controversial social problems.

Starting on Sunday July 6, at 2 p.m. they are presenting a series of half-hour television programs on CHCH-TV, Channel 11, dealing with such issues as youth's sexual problems, the generation gap, the early years of marriage, problems of the aged, family life, psychiatry and mental illness, the retarded child, the unforgiving parent, and the scramble for the fast buck.

Color movies, with professional actors and Ralph Bellamy as host, will dramatize these issues. On alternate Sundays, at the same time, a panel of experts drawn from various parts of the Niagara Diocese will discuss the issues raised.

It is likely that many churches will wish to continue the debates, in discussion groups and Young people's organizations.

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
