At its regular monthly meeting held Monday, June 23, Nassagaweya council:

\* Heard a complaint from Deputy-Reeve Mrs. A. MacArthur that vibrations from blasting at the stone quarries are growing worse. She also informed council she was going to prepare a brief on the situation for presentation to the Minister of Mines.

\* Called for a further study into Halton Region Conservation Authority's move to supply more water to Milton by digging new wells. Council members complained when the wells are drilled the water table would be lower, possibly causing some wells in the township to go dry.

\* Heard Milton Fire Area Committee representative Archie Service present his plan for supplying preliminary fire service to outlying regions in the fire area. Full support was given to him by council to go ahead and present his plan at the next Fire Area meeting.

\* Was informed of a new plan to set up a Halton County plumbing inspection service. Council voted to have a study made of the plan and agreed to come up with a solution within the next two weeks.






