Vacation time for the outdoorsman. What a wonderful feeling to get away for a few weeks into the great outdoors. Usually too much is planned for too little a time, but this year let's all try to plan for a more leisurely vacation in the great outdoors; to laze in the sun, fish, go boating, or swimming, etc., but before all, take time and think safety.

You have waited so long for vacation time to roll around and it's here at last. Plan your vacation hours wisely and enjoy them. Please don't turn a motor trip into a marathon by trying to do 500 or 600 miles in a day. This tends to build up tension and fatigue.

How can you enjoy fishing or camping after driving long distances in all that heat and traffic? If you get tired, pull over, let the kids out for a run, stop by a northern stream for half an hour and then be on your way. Try it—it works!

Did you know you cannot sneeze without closing your eyes and if you are driving at 70 miles per hour and you sneeze, you will cover 330 yards dazed and semi-blinded? Think about it.

Now that vacation time is upon us, residents in the suburban areas have a big problem and it's not the insect or animal kind. It is the human litterbug. Our Halton Sportsmen's Association fishing director Don tells me he just returned again with a full catch. These reports of fishermen returning with a full catch is just not a matter of luck. It is wise planning on the time to fish, bait to use, how to present it, and what lake to do your fishing on.

Results of re-establishing wild turkeys in southern Ontario to date have been most discouraging. The most success with rearing these wary birds has been within the Orillia Fish and Game Club, which incidentally has won the prize for conservation work for the past few years.

In the early days, wild turkeys were exceedingly abundant in the eastern part of the province. Early settlers have repeatedly mentioned this magnificent bird in their journals. The bird was an important part of their diet and was hunted by both whites and Indians.

According to the records, these birds had almost completely vanished by 1902. In the past, a lot of southwestern Ontario was covered by hardwood forests consisting of oak, beech, maple and birch. Such forests provided an excellent habitat for wild turkeys but now there is little cover left.

Introduction was tried several times in Ontario between 1950 and 1955 but the birds again vanished by 1957. As large forest tracts diminished, so did the wild turkey. It was the age and not the gun that made this beautiful bird disappear from Ontario.

Seeking new coach for junior hockey

The executive of the Milton Merchants Junior Hockey Club held its annual meeting Wednesday and announced the club was scouting around for a new coach for the 1969-70 season. Executive members appointed a committee of president Dave Brush and manager Al Parton to look after selection of the new coach. It was also announced a new member would be joining the

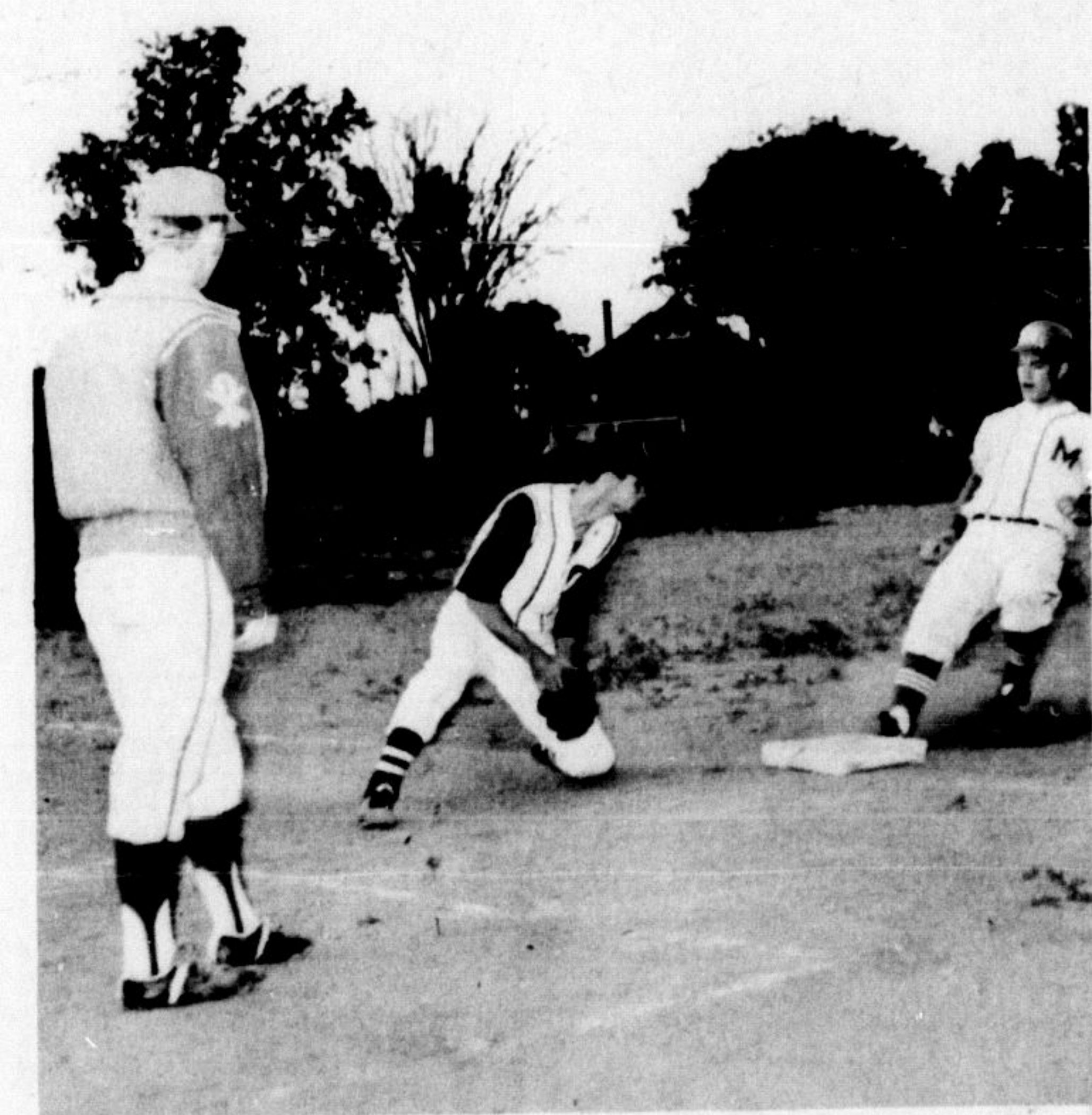
Hamilton helps to down Hamilton 6-0
