For the honeymoon trip, the

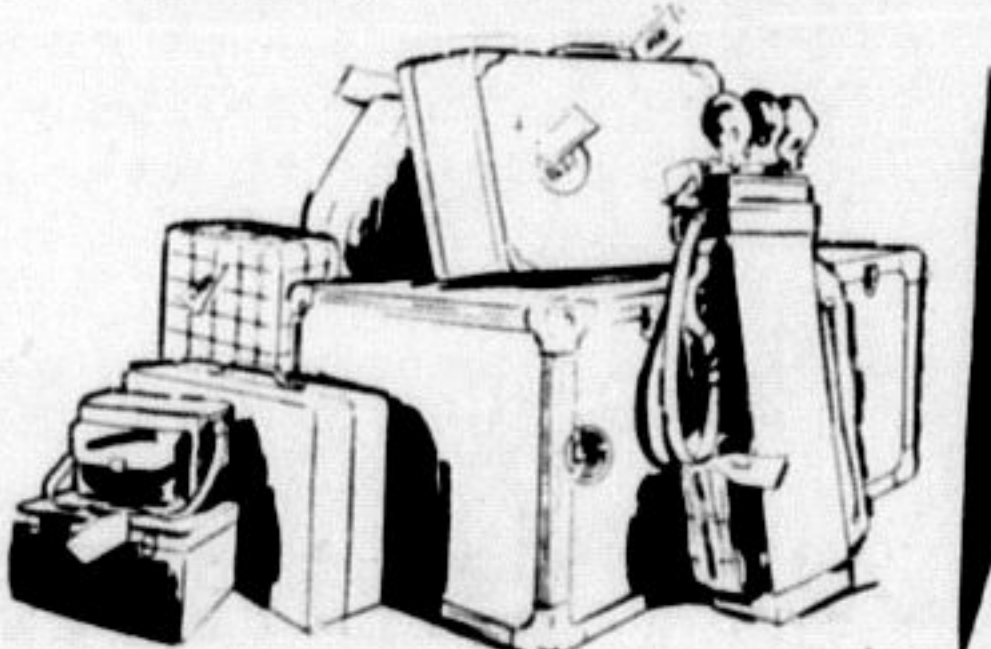
bride wore a two-piece grey and black tweed suit with black patent accessories and a corsage of gold roses.
