## C'ville sparkles in 23-3 defeat of highly rated Penetang group

Campbellville opened their best of five series with Penetang in Campbellville on Sunday and overwhelmed the Georgian Bay community by a score of 23-3. Penetang are a much better team than they showed on Sunday but Campbellville completely demoralized them in the first inning by jumping into a nine run lead.

The damage was done by a double by Lang, singles by Moore and Dredge, a sacrifice fly, a walk, Chester's single, an error, singles by Andrews and Hamilton's sacrifice, and singles by Moore and Dredge, their second of the inning.

Campbellville made it 10-0 by scoring again in the third. Andrews walked, stole second and scored on Lang's single. Two more came in the fifth to make it 12-0. Penetang picked up ten hits off Hamilton and Roberts including a triple and three doubles. This output would be more than enough to win most games so Penetang could well be heard from yet. The Campbellville duo struck out ten and only walked one the first batter of the game.

Elmer Dredge, Halton County's most valuable player of 1969, had six for six including a double. He also walked once. Ken Moore had five hits including a home run and a double and Peter Andrews had three hits and scored four runs. Doug Lang doubled and singled and George Chester singled twice. Larry McPhail homered. Bill Dennis tripled, Bruce Evans doubled and Bill Elliot, Bill Currie and Harry Hamilton singled.

The second game of the series will be played in Penetang on Sunday August 31 at 2.30 p.m. with the third game in Campbellville on Monday September 1 (Labour Day) also at 2.30. If a fifth game is necessary it will be in Campbellville as they won the toss.

Manager Earl Cairns had his team running more than at any previous time in the year. Veterans Ken Moore and Elmer Dredge both stole successfully. Doug Lang picked up another and Pete Andrews purloined four.

It was encouraging for Campbellville fans to see both Doug Lang and Jack Roberts back in action after being out with injuries.

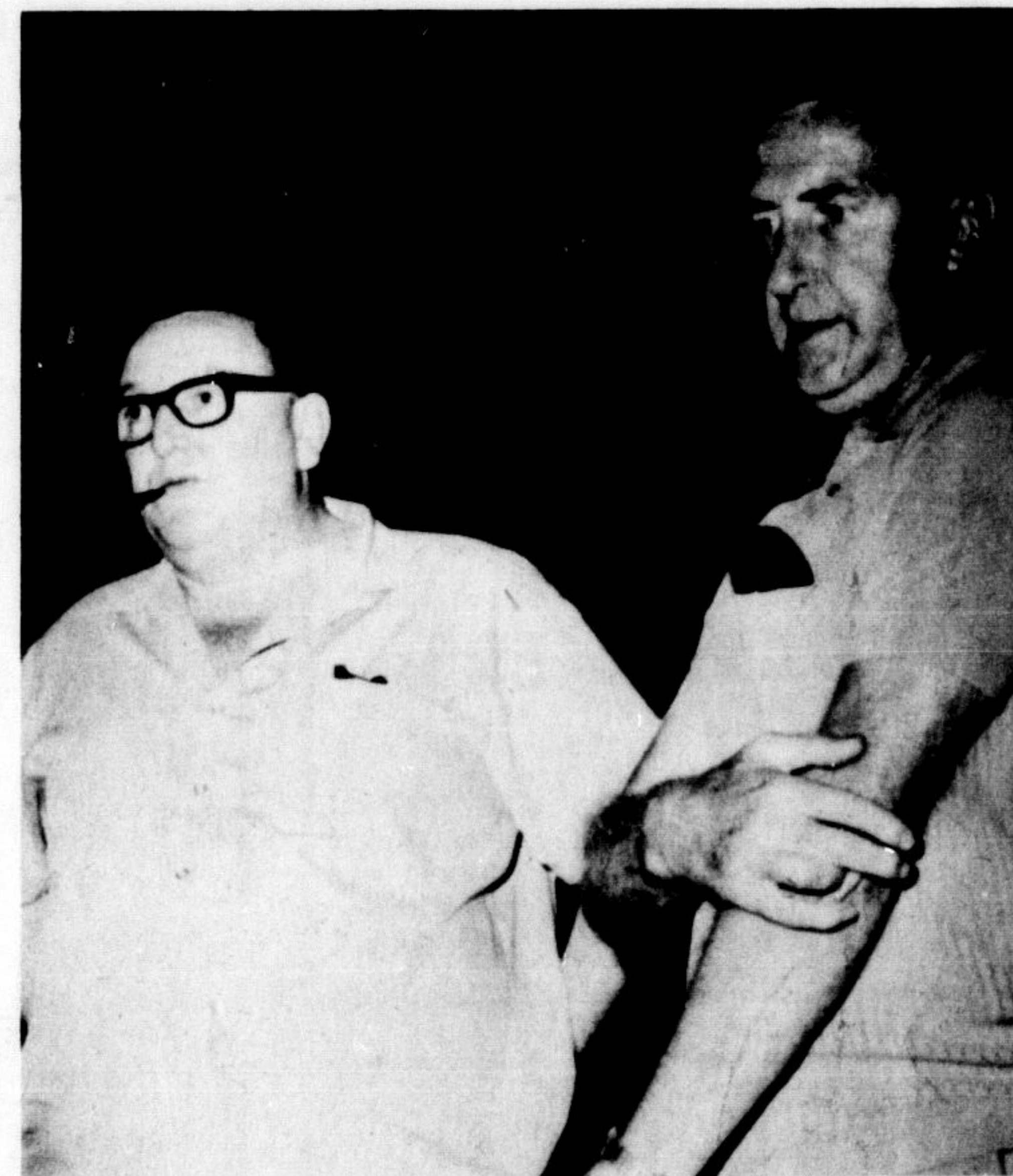
