Residents of Milton Heights to decide whether they want water main, hydrant

The onus for the installation of an eight inch water main and hydrants in Milton Heights will rest with the hamlet's residents. Esquing Council decided at Monday's regular meeting.

Councillor Ken Marshall told council he had discussed installation of water services to the Heights with Milton mayor Brian Bast who said the town could increase the water pressure five pounds to the inch. This would handle the town's needs as well as a line to the Milton Heights area.

and representatives from Milton produced no solution to the problem because Milton had no extra water at the time. However, since then the town has added a new well and the increased gallonage would make it possible to supply the Milton Heights area with water. Charge for the service would be two and a half times the normal rate.

Council decided Monday a public meeting for residents of both townships to inform them of the cost of this project would be the next logical step. Residents could then decide

whether they wanted to proceed. No date was set for the meeting. Councillor Marshall also asked council for an outline of the steps necessary to install street lights in Milton Heights, since a resident had discussed the subject with him.

Milton Council Briefs

Would form Halton Museum Auxiliary

In committee and council discussion Milton Council Monday:

- * Learned the administration committee was considering a brief to the province on welfare. Councillor G. Krantz pointed out that much of the current welfare expenditure is for transients who remain in town.
- * Heard a meeting of the works committee and staff was planned this week to investigate re-routing drainage to the creek to overcome the flooding on the west end of Mill St.
- * Received a report from the administration committee that nine applications had been received for the position of building inspector, zoning administrator, trench inspector and plumbing inspector. Interviews are to be arranged.
- * Approved a call for tenders on the Main-Martin repaving project following Department of Highways approval of the plans. Tenders on the work will close September 8. It was explained the final coat of paving might not be applied until spring and some sidewalk construction might also be delayed until spring on the project.
- * Accepted the tender of Gil Van Soelen at \$1,180 for the

painting of the exterior of the town hall.

- * Requested an estimate on the cost of preliminary engineering for two sub trunk sewer lines. One is proposed east on the Base Line to the Third Line and north on the former Esquing Third Line to Highway 401. Another is proposed from the new major trunk line, north of the CPR east to Main St.
- * Authorized R. V. Anderson and Associates to prepare drawings on the piping and provisions for the new well at Kelso which is expected to be connected to the town system by November.
- * Accepted the tender of British Petroleum for the supply of gas, diesel fuel and lubricants. The tender was the lowest of several submitted.

Plans are underway to form a Museum Auxiliary to work with the Halton County Museum at Kelso, and an appeal went out this week for volunteers willing to contribute some of their time and talents to the project.

Letters have gone out to several Halton organizations, appealing for members to launch an auxiliary for the Museum. The Museum's present budget and staff make it impossible to do everything the museum should be doing, the letter explains, and now that the Halton County Board of Education has expressed a desire to use the museum's facilities for education, the staff should be spending more time on restoration and research.

Halton Museum was opened in 1969 in the old barn on the Duff Alexander farm in the centre of Kelso Conservation Area. It has grown and grown, more buildings have been opened, and the crowds have increased year after year. The County of Halton Centennial project was a carriage house that opened there in 1967. Today the museum is renowned as one of the finest county museums in Canada, yet museum officials admit they are still suffering from "growing pains".

2. Optometrist — a non-medical graduate of a college of optometry licensed to test vision, prescribe and fit glasses and treat optical and eye muscle defects without drugs or surgery. An optician is a skilled technician who grinds lenses to prescription and fits eye glasses. He does not test vision unless he is also an optometrist.
