Canon J. E. Maxwell officiated at the double ring ceremony, and Mrs. A. Bye was organist. She played O Perfect Love.

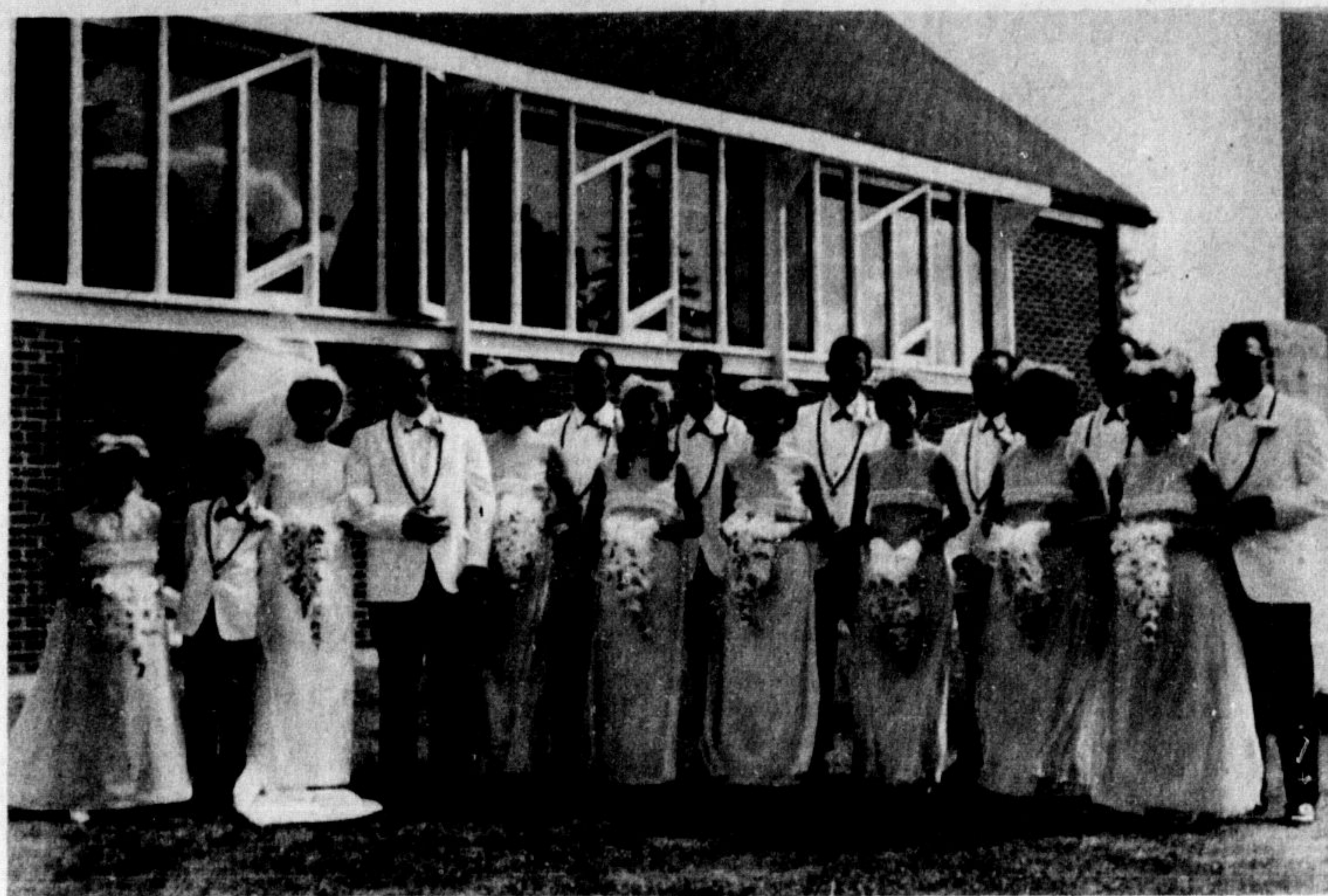

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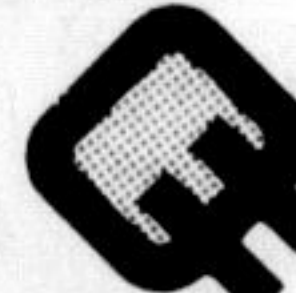


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
