

### Halton municipalities represented at O.M.A.

Every municipality in Halton was represented at the recent Niagara Falls convention of the Ontario Municipal Association.

A host of resolutions on municipal topics were debated and approved during the three day sessions including two presented by Nassagaweya Township and spoken to by Reeve A. MacArthur.

Warden G. Currie the oldest county warden present and the only one to hold the position twice, was recognized on the convention floor.

Among the 1,200 delegates and wives present were Reeve A. Ledwith and Deputy Reeve R. Harris with clerk J. McGeachie from Milton; Reeve A. MacArthur and Deptuy Reeve G. Agnew from Nassagaweya; Reeve G. Currie and Deputy Reeve T. Hill from Esquesing; Mayor L. Duby, Reeve F. G. Oakes and Deputy Reeve T. Tyler from Acton; Mayor W. Emmerson, Reeve W. Hunter and Deputy Reeve A. Speight from Georgetown; Reeve A. Day and Deputy Reeve W. Gillies from Oakville and Mayor Harrington and Deputy Reeve B. Reeve from Burlington.

The resolutions presented to the convention numbered 137 and covered administration, assessment and taxation, eduction, elections, employee-employer relations, finance, health and welfare, highways, housing, law enforcement, planning and land use controls, regional government, safety and water and air pollution.


