### Dairy princess from Brampton

The girl from Peel County who defeated Halton's entry in the Ontario Dairy Princess competition went on to win the Ontario title. Lorene Archdekin, 18, of Brampton was named Ontario Dairy Princess at the CNE last week, and Mrs. William Stewart, wife of the Ontario agriculture minister, crowned her.

Earlier in the competition Lorene had defeated Sharon Hume, Halton's entry in the preliminaries.

#### No concessions to north

North Burlington residents will have to continue helping to pay for sidewalks in the urban section of town, Burlington Council ruled last week. Northern residents will receive no tax concessions on library and recreation costs, either.

Councillors Wes Gall and Art Lindop, who represent the northern ridings argued unsuccessfully for a change in the taxation. Mr. Gall said rural residents have to pay from 50 cents to \$2 a year for upkeep of sidewalks they don't use, and have to travel great distances to take advantage of full library and recreation facilities. Mayor George Harrington reminded him that one-quarter of the town's 337 acres of parks and most of its 955 acres of conservation land is located in north Burlington.

### Barn destroyed by fire

A tractor, some hay and straw were lost when fire levelled a 50 by 80 foot barn at the Seventh Line Esquesing farm of Harry Bessey, R. R. 2, Georgetown last week. Mr. and Mrs. Bessey were asleep in the house when the fire was noticed by a neighbor about 10.30 p.m.

The barn was built in the 1870's. Mr. Bessey had sold the farm to a man in Italy last December but retained the house, barn and a shed and two and a half acres of land for himself. It was the seventh barn razing in the Georgetown area to date this year. Firefighters suspect an arsonist is responsible for some of the fires.

### Urge province pay more

A brief from Halton Young Progressive Conservatives urges the provincial government to assume more than 60 per cent of the cost of education. The brief, a seven page report that took a year to prepare, supports the consolidation of school boards, recommends budget review boards to avert hassles over budgets such as that experienced in Halton earlier this year, and the cancelling of budget supplements for municipalities with a population of over 190,000.

The YPCs also recommend school buildings and facilities should be made available to the public outside of school hours-especially pools, gymns, and classrooms. They urge integration of school libraries into the public library systems to avoid duplication of service and obviate the need for more public libraries. A province-wide standard scale of teachers' salaries is also urged, as well as standards of construction for schools.


### B. Hatfield attends fire school course




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## Road building finished by fall

Construction of a new road surface on Number Ten Sideroad west of Milton Hospital is proceeding on schedule according to Halton County engineer D. J. Corbett.

The re-surfacing, which started in the middle of June, is being done by Bramall Construction of Mississauga at a cost of \$112,000. They are expected to be completed by Sept. 15 and this includes building up a new base for the road, putting on three inches of asphalt and installing culverts.

Mr. Corbett told The Champion the work is being done because the original road base had collapsed in spots and was patched with asphalt Pee Wee hockey anywhere up to seven inches in

A second new road is being built north of Campbellville which will by-pass the village, thus taking heavy truck traffic off the village streets.

It stretches from the entrance to Campbellville Sand and Gravel to the Guelph Line, at the entrance to Mohawk Raceway. It will become the new county road.

Work started at the site in early July and is expected to be finished by the middle of October although Mr. Corbett said work crews are running into trouble because of unexpected bedrock formations they have run into which have delayed

The estimated cost of the project is \$122,000 but it could run higher as a result of the unexpected delays. County road crews and day laborers are doing the work.

Dear Sir: The flow of traffic was heavy on one of the main


