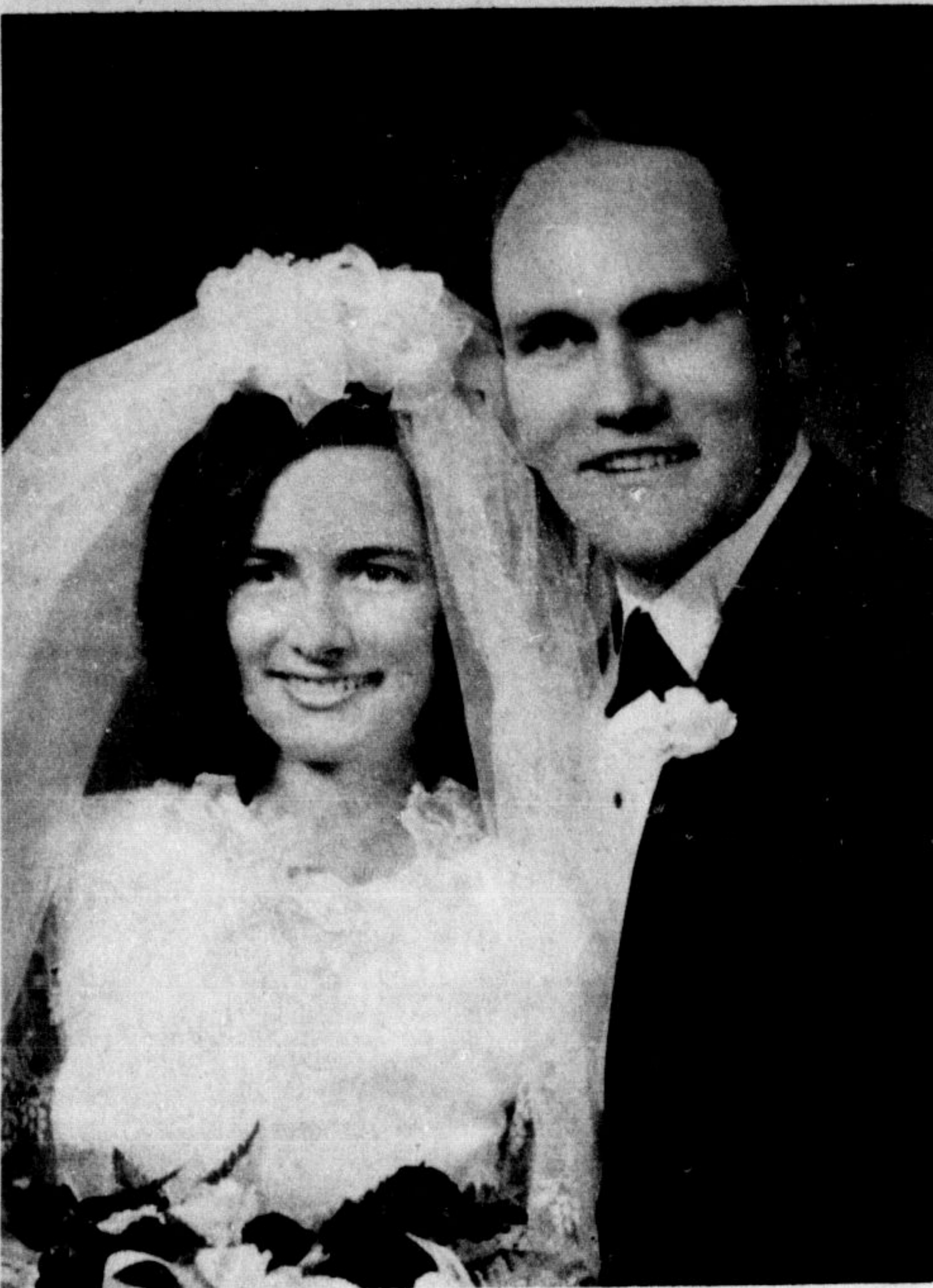


Evans-Haller
