

Answer to loitering?

Wants pool room open on Sundays

A 163-name petition requesting Sunday opening of the pool hall was submitted to Milton Council last week by Cesare Casto. He sought permission for the pool room to be open Sunday from 2 p.m. to 8 p.m.

Mayor B. Best told Council the pool room had been open the two previous Sundays and he was surprised at the absence of young people on the street.

Opening would require an amendment to the present Sunday sport by-law but no plebiscite would be necessary, the deputy clerk reported.

"I'm unalterably opposed to opening up the pool room on Sunday", Councilor C. Smillie

declared. He reviewed that council considered a similar request last year and unanimously opposed it. "We found recreation in our day and it wasn't in a pool room", he concluded.

Mayor Best pointed out the pool room had been open two Sundays although it was not legal and the problem of

loitering seemed to have been reduced.

"That doesn't cut any ice with me. There is lots of activity in this part of the country without opening the pool room", Councilor Smillie retorted.

Council agreed to refer the matter to the administration committee and police chief for consideration.

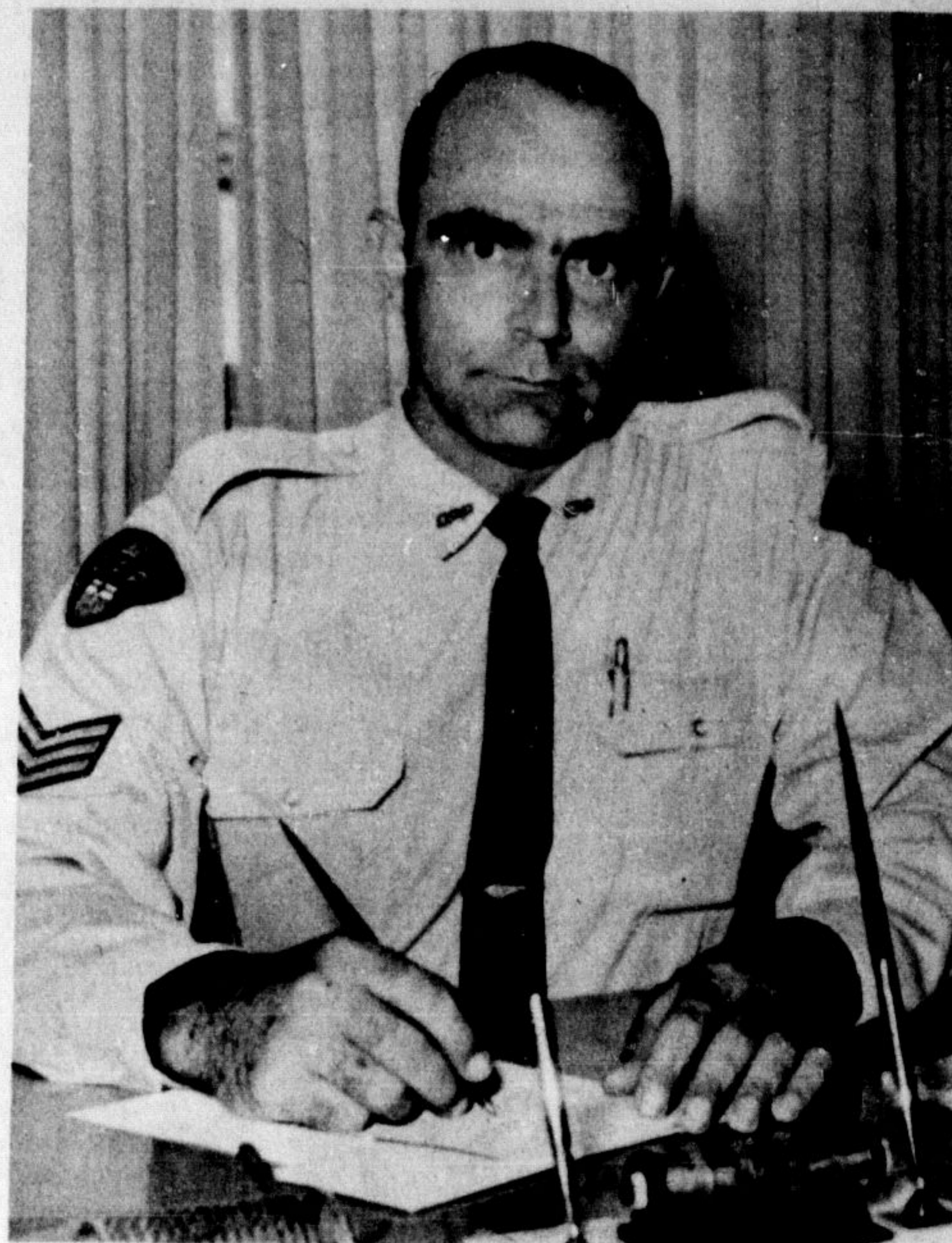
117th Milton fair here on Sept. 26, 27

It's nearly "heigh, ho, come to the fair" time in Milton again. Friday and Saturday, Sept. 26 and 27, the 117th annual Milton Fair will be staged at the fair grounds, under the sponsorship of the Halton Agricultural Society. President George Readhead, and the fair board's 95 directors and associate directors have been working for the past year, lining up another fine county show for that weekend.

The 76-page prize list is currently being distributed to hundreds of exhibitors who are preparing their entries in horse, beef and dairy cattle, sheep, goat, swine, poultry, grain, hay, vegetable, fruit, domestic and

preserves, women's work, flowers and plants, arts and crafts, school, junior and 4-H club exhibits. There is \$5,000 in prize money awaiting the winners.

Milton's 1969 fair will open on the Friday with most of the first day spent in judging exhibits. That evening the halls and midway will be open to the public. Saturday is fun day at the fair, with the grounds open in the morning and competitions and programs continuing until suppertime. Harness races will begin at 1:30 p.m. on the race track and the Hon. George Kerr, Ontario Minister of Energy and Resources Management, will officially open the fair at 2 p.m.

19-year veteran heads Milton OPP

An Ontario Provincial Police veteran of 19 years, Sgt. M. R. Speicher has just taken charge of the Milton OPP detachment, after spending the summer in charge of the summer detachment at Grand Bend.

Sgt. Speicher is married and has three children.

He started in the OPP at Kenora and moved from there to Dryden, Guelph, Kitchener, Walkerton, Mount Forest and Grand Bend, 19 years in all. He says he liked his work in the north and was impressed by the size of the country. Sgt.

Speicher said it was common to investigate an accident which had occurred up to 150 miles away from the detachment. He also mentioned the only communications they had then was the telephone.

His hobbies include gardening, tropical fish and nearly any activity in the outdoors, including hockey.

His last posting, at Grand Bend resort where he was in charge of the summer detachment, lasted from May 15 to Sept. 2 and he and his 24 men looked after the enormous job of crowd and traffic control.

Sgt. Speicher is in charge of 30 men at the Milton detachment.

Dedicate St. David's new manse on Sunday

St. David's Presbyterian Church in Campbellville—recently renovated, carpeted and redecorated for the church's centennial year, will be officially re-dedicated in a special service at 11 a.m. this Sunday, Sept. 14. Following the service the congregation will move to the new manse next door to the church, which will be officially dedicated at a ribbon cutting ceremony.

The Rev. E. H. Johnson, B.Sc., Th.B., D.D., Moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, will officiate at the day and will officiate at the two ceremonies.

Dr. Johnson will first attend a men's centennial breakfast at the church, scheduled for 9 a.m. He will speak at the 11 a.m. service and remain to conduct the dedication of the new manse. Following the dedication ceremony, the manse will be open to the congregation for tours.

Assisting in the services will be

the minister of St. David's, the Rev. D. R. Nicholson. A warm welcome is extended to everyone to attend.

As Overseas Secretary of The Presbyterian Church in Canada Dr. Johnson has become widely known as a Christian world statesman, especially for his tireless efforts to bring relief and to effect a reconciliation in the tragic Nigeria/Biafra conflict.

Born in Montreal, he graduated from McGill University with the gold medal in mathematics and physics. He took his theology at Princeton Theological Seminary and went on to post-graduate studies at New College, Edinburgh and the University of Berlin.

His first charge was at Long Branch, Ontario. In 1935 he was appointed by the general Board of Missions to overseas service in Manchuria where he served until 1941 when he was forced to withdraw by the Japanese aggression. For the ensuing five years he served the church in Canada as Secretary for

Missionary Education. From 1947-1954 he was General Secretary of the Student Volunteer Movement for Christian Missions, based in New York City.

In 1954 he was called to his present position in which he has oversight of our church's overseas mission involvement. He has been active in World Council of Churches committees and is a keen observer of world affairs.

Dr. and Mrs. Johnson have three daughters and one son.

Mrs. Johnson has travelled widely accompanying her husband on many of his journeys as Overseas Secretary in the Caribbean, South America, Africa, Japan and Formosa.

Apartment is damaged by fire, smoke

An upstairs apartment at the home of Jack Hardy, 91 Mill St., was badly damaged by fire, smoke and water Wednesday afternoon of last week.

The apartment, vacant at the time, was rented to Mr. and Mrs. Michael Devlin. It broke out in a bedroom where the worst damage resulted, and firefighters later reported it appears a faulty electrical cord was the cause of the blaze.

Fire Chief A. E. Clement said the bed, floor and wall of the bedroom were badly burned before the fire could be contained. Smoke and water damage were reported through the apartment, and in the lower floor occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Hardy. Both families had insurance.

The fire was first noticed by Emerson Downs of Robert St., who was driving past on Mill St. and saw smoke pouring out the upstairs window. He alerted the fire brigade from the home of a neighbor Mrs. R. L. McDuffie, then he and another neighbor Maurice Poole grabbed a garden hose and started pouring water in an upstairs window.

Witnesses said the house was so full of smoke it was impossible to enter, and firefighters had to don masks to quell the flames in the smoke-filled apartment.

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1. 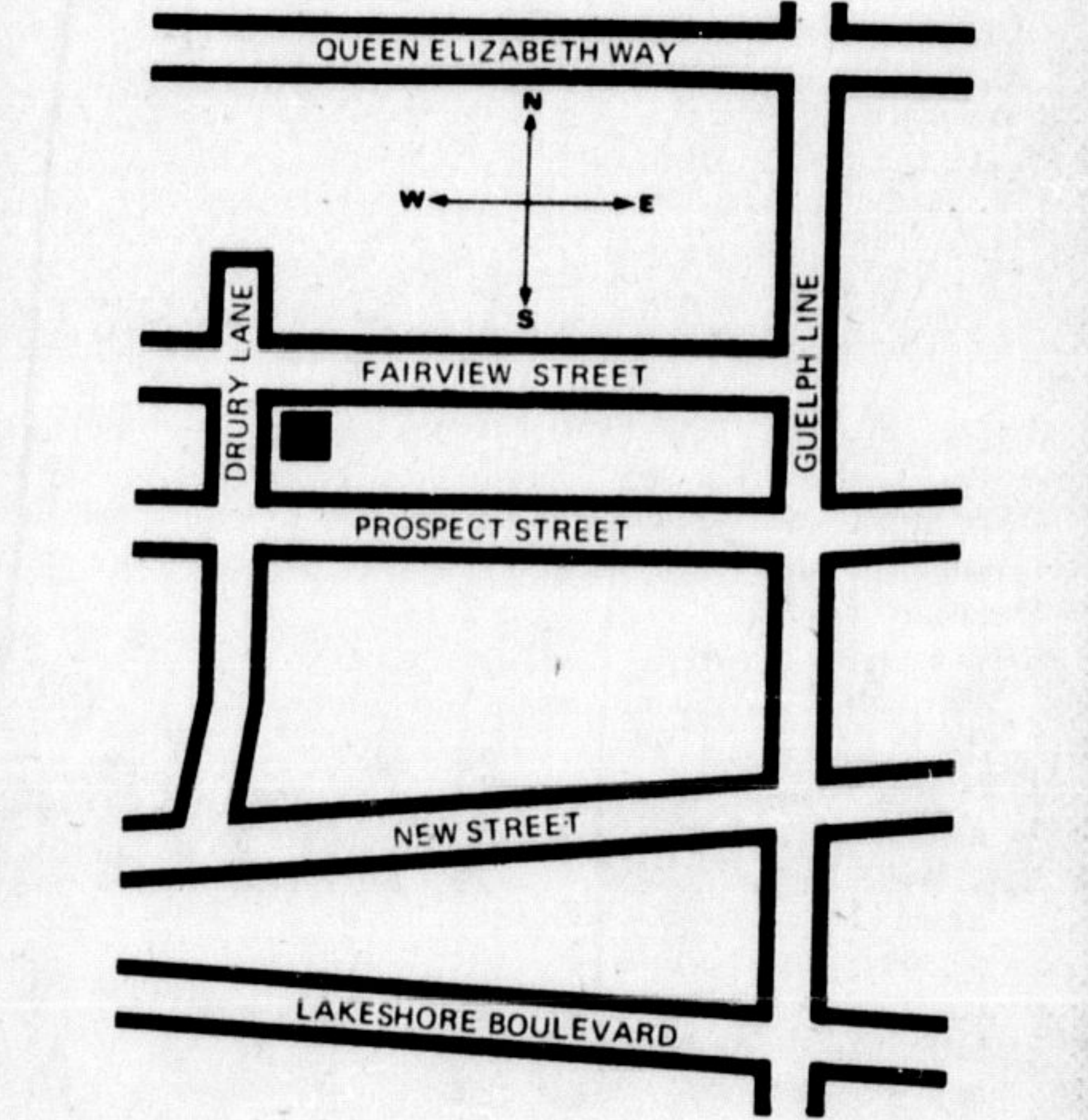
