miles from Yellowknife. They will help their trainees

plan camp programs, menus, buying of supplies, teach health and safety rules and share cultural skills such as folk-singing, dancing, puppetry, crafts, nature and games. Trainees who will come from all over the Territories, will lean how to organize youth activities in their own communities on their return. Their visiting leaders also hope to learn from

Guider-in-charge is Dr. Mary Habgood of Inuvik, N.W.T. and her assistant is Mrs. A. E. Hayden, Whitehorse, Y.T.

Six girls from western Canada will travel by boat to such Newfoundland outposts as Port aux Basques, Burgeo, Ramea, St. Albans, Harbour Breton and Terrenceville, and by car and bus to Grand Falls, St. John's and Cornerbrook. They will be billetted in local schoolhouses and will bring their crafts, songs and leadership training skills to people of all ages.

Guider-in-charge is Phyllis Reid, a public health nurse from Newfoundland, and her assistant is Marjorie Pike, of St. John's, Newfoundland.

"Operation Out-Look" has been planned for more than a year, and the girls are thoroughly briefed by monthly letters from leaders. Also being circulated are training kits containing records, tapes, slides, books, craft assignments and scrapbooks to familiarize the girls with their respective areas. Teams will meet in Toronto en route to both projects for a complete briefing and later for evaluation sessions.


