

206 works of art in open air show at Centennial Park

"Orange Curtains" mixed with "Moon Babies" Saturday afternoon at the Milton Arts and Crafts Society's annual outdoor art show held at Centennial Park. Both of these were among works of art entered by local artists for showing.

Twenty-seven artists entered the show and 206 paintings were put on display along with smaller handicrafts, sculptures and hand made jewellery. Most of the work, besides being on display, was also on sale and some art viewers walked away as art purchasers.

This is the second year for the showing at Centennial Park although previous shows have been held by the society.

Mrs. Gwen Hadley, one of the organizers of the show said, "things seemed to go fairly well and we had very good response from the public." The only criticism was there wasn't enough snow fencing on which to hang the works of art but recent construction in the town has made this fencing at a premium.

The Saturday exhibition was held across the road from the Hospital Auxiliary lawn party and many visitors attended both functions.

ESQUESING Township Council BRIEFS

At their regular meeting Monday night, Esquesing township Council:

* Passed a resolution that the Council of the Township of Esquesing respectfully request that the Council of the County of Halton consider the immediate installation of "automatic traffic lights" at the intersection of Trafalgar Road and Steeles Avenue, since the present installation is very definitely dangerous. The resolution was passed after a request for some action on the intersection by Halton County Board of Education trustee William Lawson.

* Passed a resolution agreeing to lend some snow fencing and posts to the Georgetown Agricultural Society on the understanding that the Society would be responsible for returning same.

* Instructed clerk-treasurer Delmar French to send copies of a letter to ratepayers in the Milton Heights area informing them that a meeting to discuss the water situation in that area will be held September 23 at Ligny School at 8 p.m.

* Received an invitation for councillors to attend the official opening of the Good Shepherd Manor in Orangeville, Sunday September 28 at 3 p.m.

* Received an invitation from the Halton County Board of Education to tour schools in the

county which provide special education, Saturday September 27.

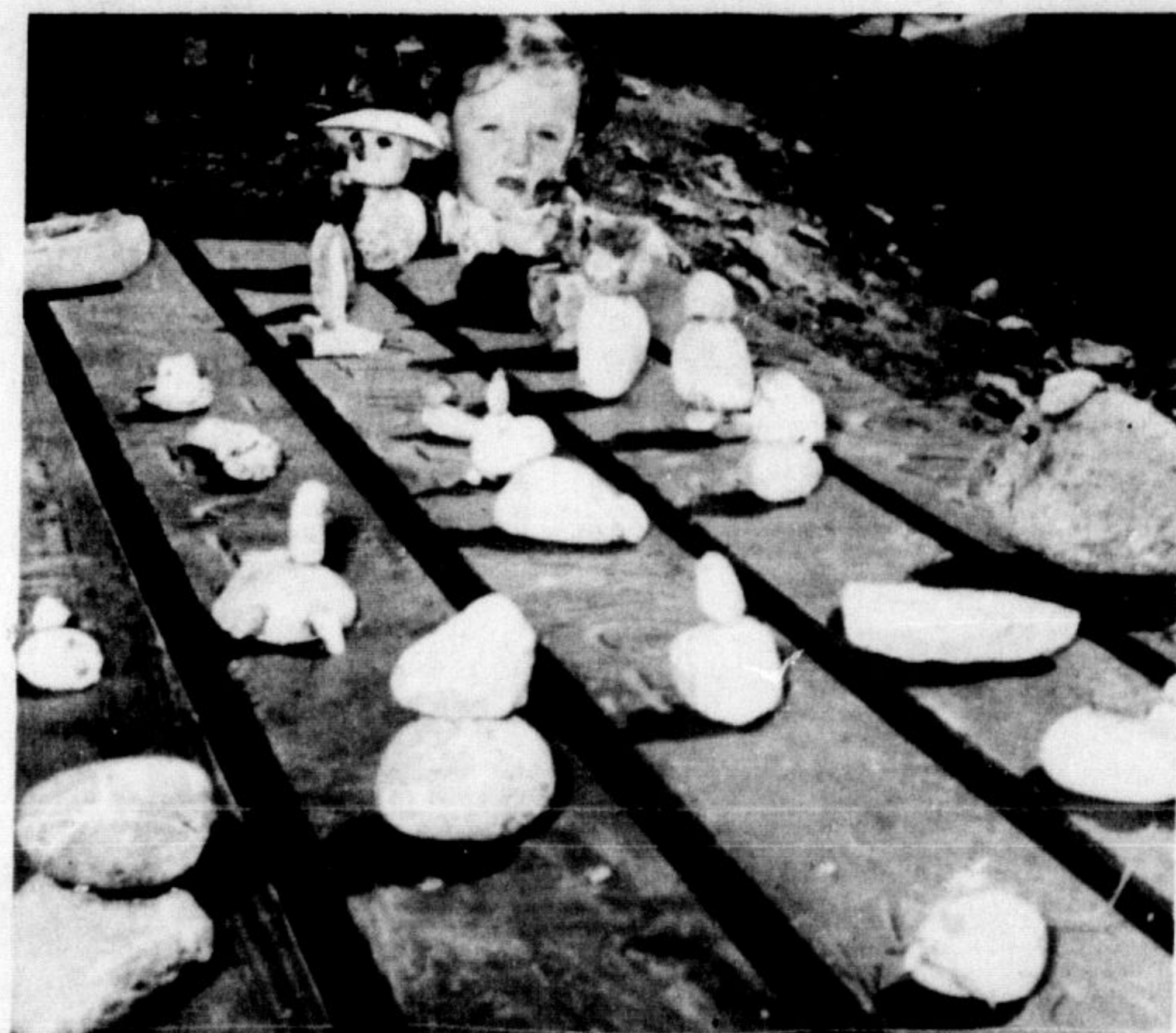
* Received a letter from the Halton County Board of Education indicating their concern over the erosion they say the Credit River is causing near Glen Williams school and suggesting that some type of retaining wall is needed.

* Received a letter from Acton Board of Parks Management and Recreation Committee criticizing the handling of the dredging operation in Fairy Lake Acton and making recommendations to the Credit Valley Conservation Authority for the future success of similar projects.

* Rescinded a previous resolution to take out membership in the Central Ontario Regional Development Council because of a misunderstanding about membership fees.

* Decided to rescind a by-law passed last year which limited the number of non-resident hunting licences sold in the township to 200 per year.

* Granted permission to Alan Francis a resident of the 5th Line near Limehouse to build a garage on his property closer to

the township road than the 68 feet that is normally required. Mr. Francis, a Gray Coach Line bus driver, explained to Council that having the garage closer to the road would make it much easier for him to get to work on time in the winter.

* Received a letter from the Ontario Association of Mayors and Reeves urging Council to

join the Association at a membership fee of \$60 a year.

* Decided that if Committee of Adjustment is undecided in the future about allowing persons to build houses on unmaintained township roads, they should send a representative to Council and the two bodies would come to a decision between themselves.
