Milton ambulance is busy nine calls in first week

Milton District Hospital's ambulance service has been in operation for just a week and the crews have been kept fairly busy with a total of nine calls.
Co-ordinator of the ambulance service, Ed Gawronski says the service has been working out very well and he is pleased with it. "The crew has been getting a real cross-section of work and during the week have put 267 miles on the vehicle.
Their first call was on Thursday, Oct. 2 at 3:30 p.m. and this was to respond to an accident. The second call came Friday at 10:24 and was a house call.
Saturday, October 4 was a hectic day for the crew who handled a total of six calls. The day began with an accident call at 1:12 p.m., a house call at 2:13 p.m., a 5:25 p.m. emergency transfer to Toronto General Hospital, an 8:01 p.m. accident, a transfer to Hamilton General Hospital at 8:30 p.m. and an accident call in Acton at 11 p.m.
The ambulance went out on a house call Sunday at 12:27.

Release names two men killed in 401 accident

Two Kitchener men were killed last Monday, Sept. 29, in a single car accident on Highway 401, east of Trafalgar Road. Dead are Hagob Garabedian, 25, driver of the 1969 car and his only passenger Vrej Shalian, 27.
According to the Milton detachment of the OPP, the car was travelling east at a high rate of speed when the driver lost control. He sidestepped a car driven by 22-year-old Gary Charette of Rexdale, and then the car flipped, end-over-end, landing sideways in the median. Both men were thrown out of

the car, and Garabedian was killed instantly.
