The talk based on "Faith, Problems and Miracles" stressed the great difficulty to procure food, clothing and housing by these poor people. Miss Avison invited the ladies to visit the Mission.

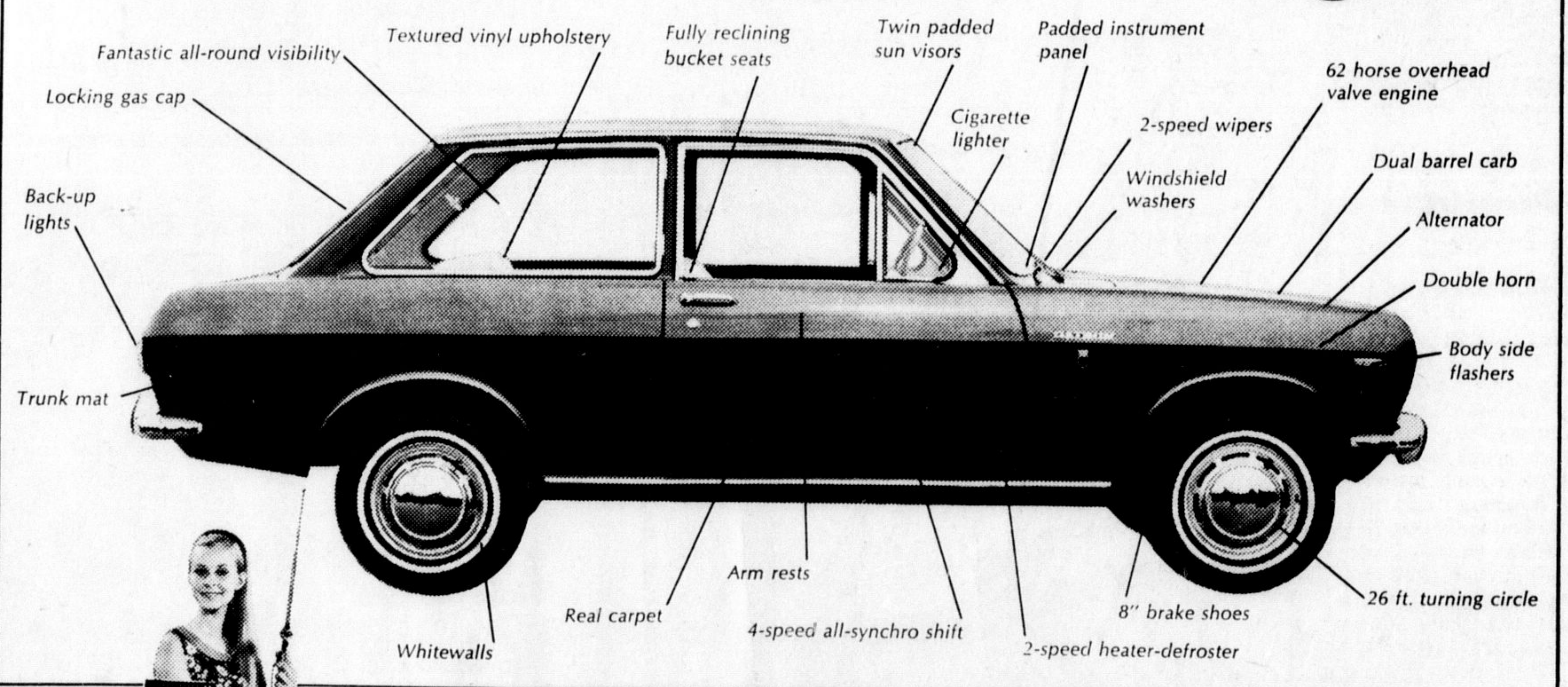
