"DEVIOUS" BILLING OF MUNICIPAL TAXES Dear Sir:

As a result of a great deal of publicity the Ontario Government passed legislation last year which has become popularly known as a bill to provide "Truth in Lending." The purpose of this bill is to make it compulsory that a borrower in Ontario fully understands the true interest rate, hidden costs, etc. prior to arranging a

submit, Sir, that the Ontario Government should now extend this bill to cover municipal taxes.

The present method of presenting the municipal tax bill is confusing, misleading, and to a great extent, dishonest. Certainly no private company or individual would dare submit an invoice in such a devious manner.

The following figures are taken from the 1969 tax billing on a residence assessed at \$4,700 which is in fact typical of the many subdivision homes we have in Milton.

Total Assessment	\$ 4700
Total Mill rate charged	86.68 mi
C. General & County Tax	\$ 72.76
SA School Tax	\$237.90
Prov. of Ont. Tax reduction	\$ 52.00
Total Taxes	\$237.90

This tax bill makes no reference to the interim levy made in Feb. and it is reasonable to assume that since many taxpayers pay their taxes together with their mortgages they are being misled by this method of billing.

Surely the proper way to submit the tax bill for this property would be as follows:

Total Assessment	\$4700
Total Mill rate charged	86.68
Total 1969 Taxes	\$407.40
Less interim billing	\$117.50
	\$289.90
Less Province Tax Reduction	\$ 52.00
Taxes Due	\$237.90

This tells the taxpayer precisely what taxes are being charged against his property and enables him to calculate "action" mug shots to illustrate sports or local political yarns.
