The honeymoon trip was to Northern Ontario. The bride wore a black and white ensemble with white accessories and a corsage of red roses.

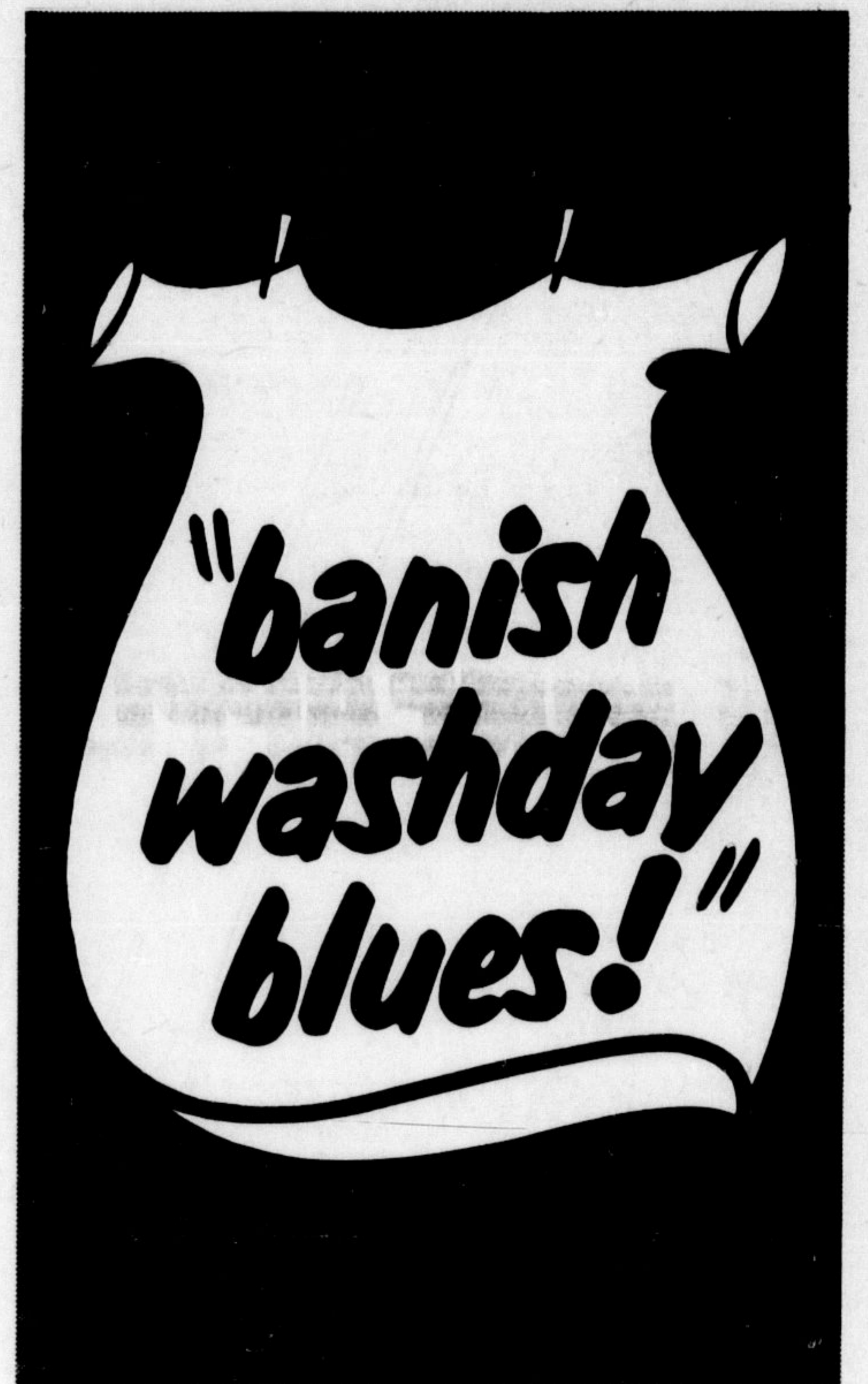
They are living at El Primo Apts., Milton.

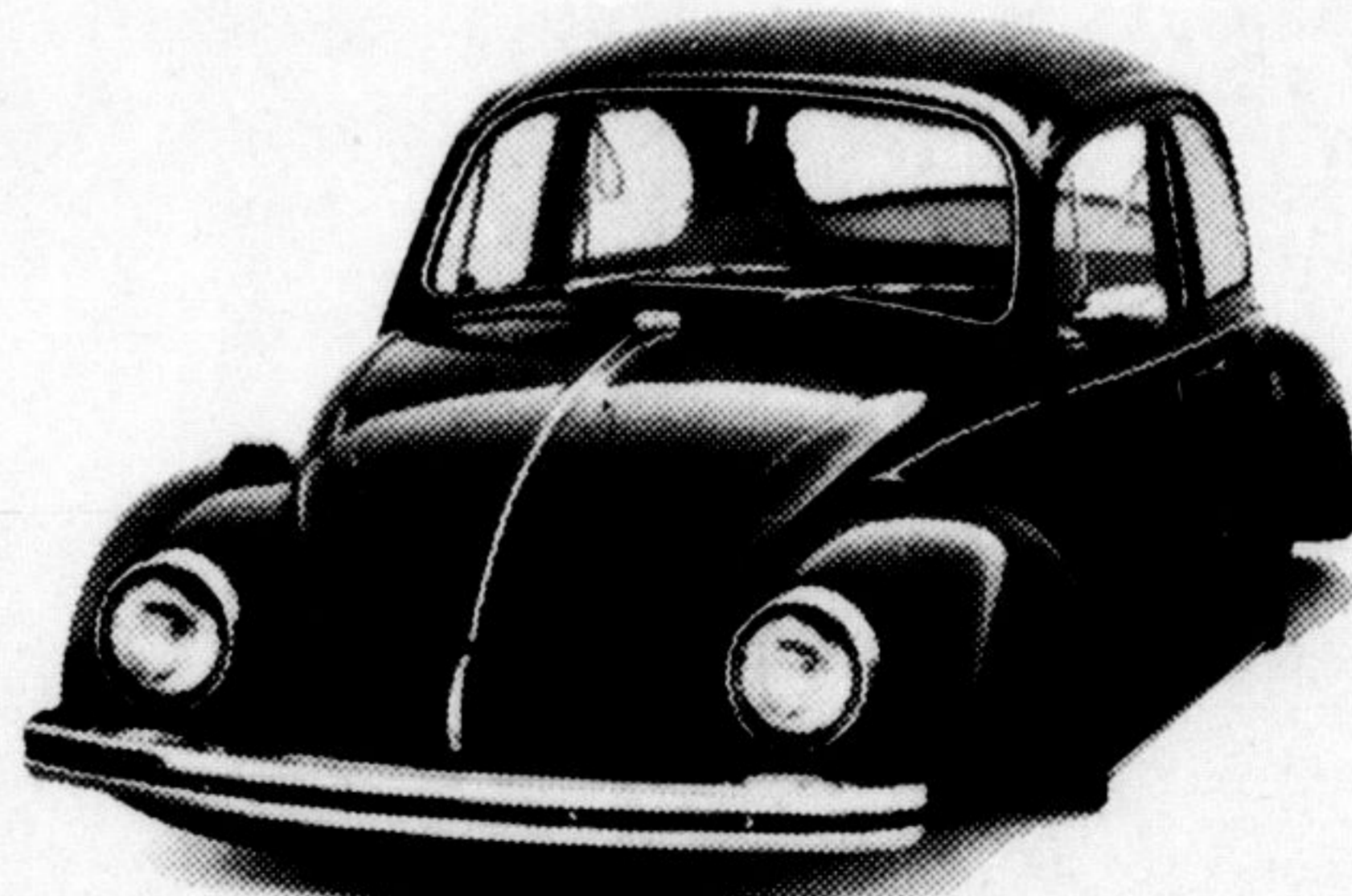
Mr. and Mrs. Tyner held a party after the rehearsal for the attendants, when the couple presented roses to their parents with their thanks.

—Many attended Georgetown Fair on the weekend. The Erin Fair is this weekend.

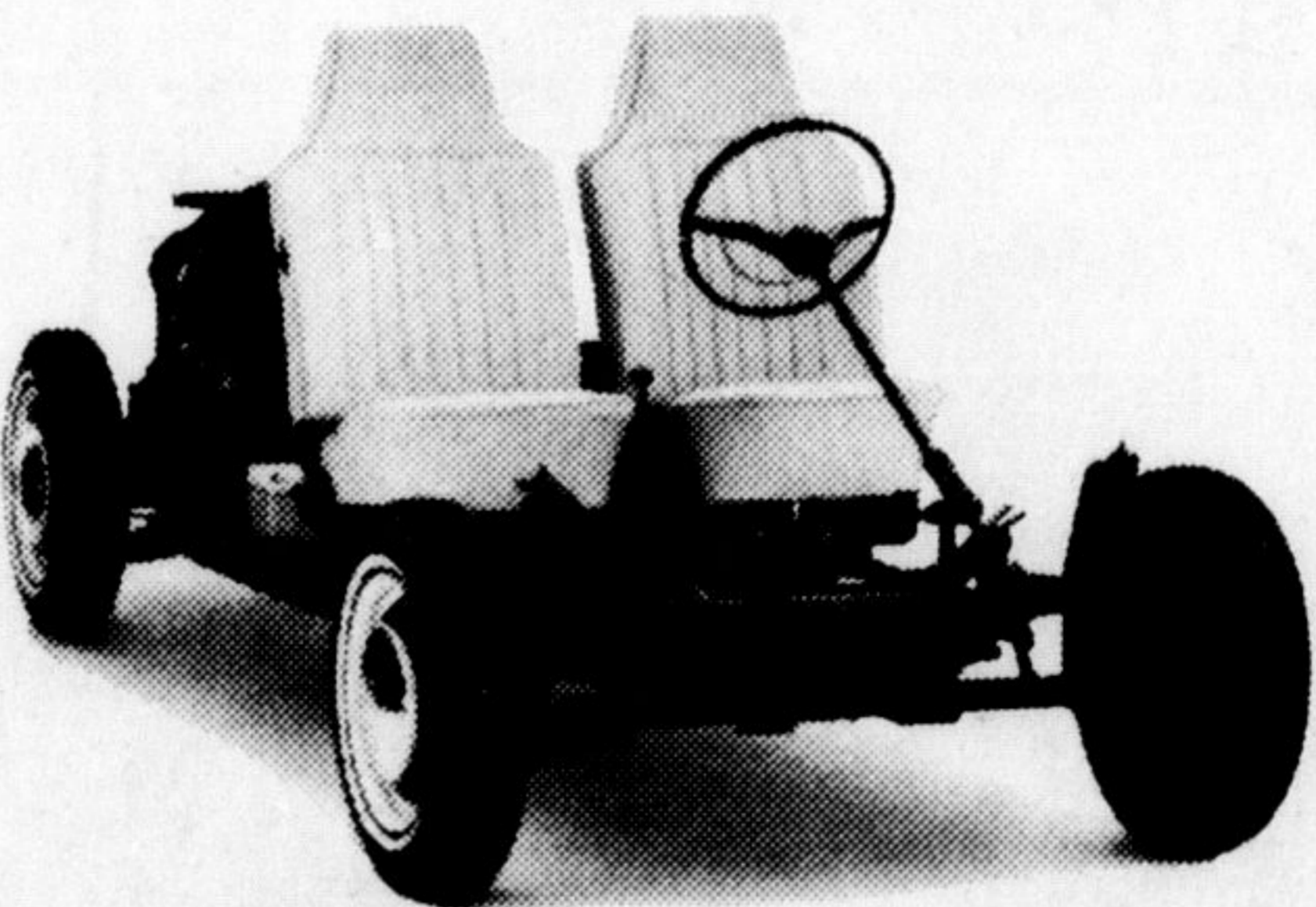
—Palermo School and two other Oakville schools were awarded plaques and Elmer the Safety Elephant flags last week for nine years without a pupil accident during school hours.



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
