

Expect 200,000 at 1969 plowing match

Up to 200,000 people are expected to attend the 1969 International Plowing Match and Farm Machinery Demonstration to be held Oct. 15, 16, 17 and 18. Site of the match is the Ross Kelley Farm and neighboring farms located two miles north of Paris on Highway 24A.

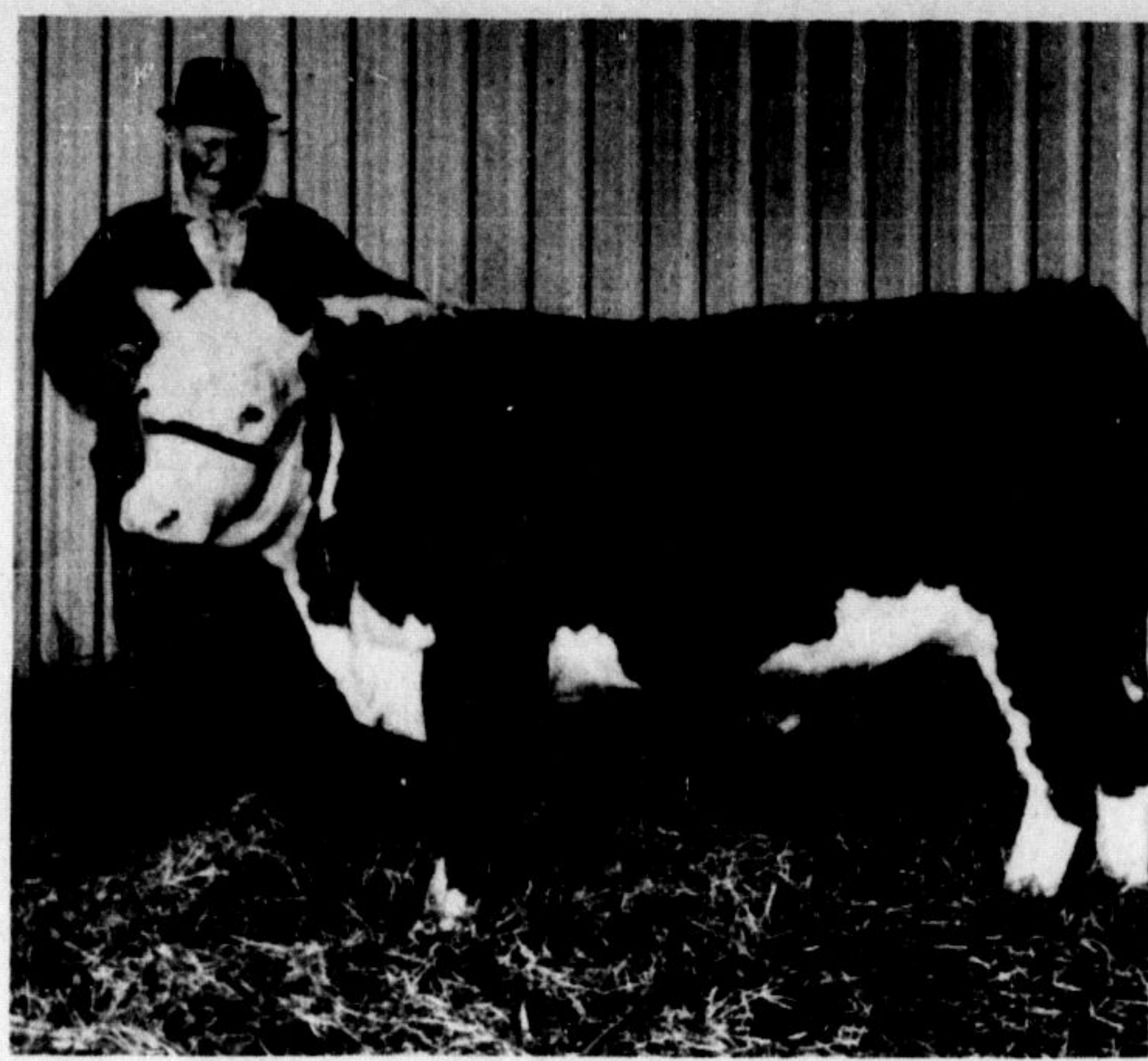
The last International plowing matches in this county were held in 1949 and 1917.

Total amount of land involved in the Match is 600 acres and this includes a Tented City occupying 70 acres, complete with its own official Mayor. It will house displays of farm

machinery and other farm goods and services.

While the major event is the competition in plowing open to plowmen in any part of the world, the four-day event includes a complete program and varied entertainment for all members of the family. For the ladies there are daily fashion shows, flower arranging, cooking and other demonstrations.

Such a gigantic show requires the co-operation and voluntary labor of many people. At the local level there are 24 committee chairmen with over 100 people working on various committees.

Plant trees in spring to replace dead elms

With the loss of many trees in Halton with Dutch Elm disease, all farmers should be thinking of planting trees next spring. Now is the time to order your trees from the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests. Write to them at Hespeler or get an application form from the Agricultural office.

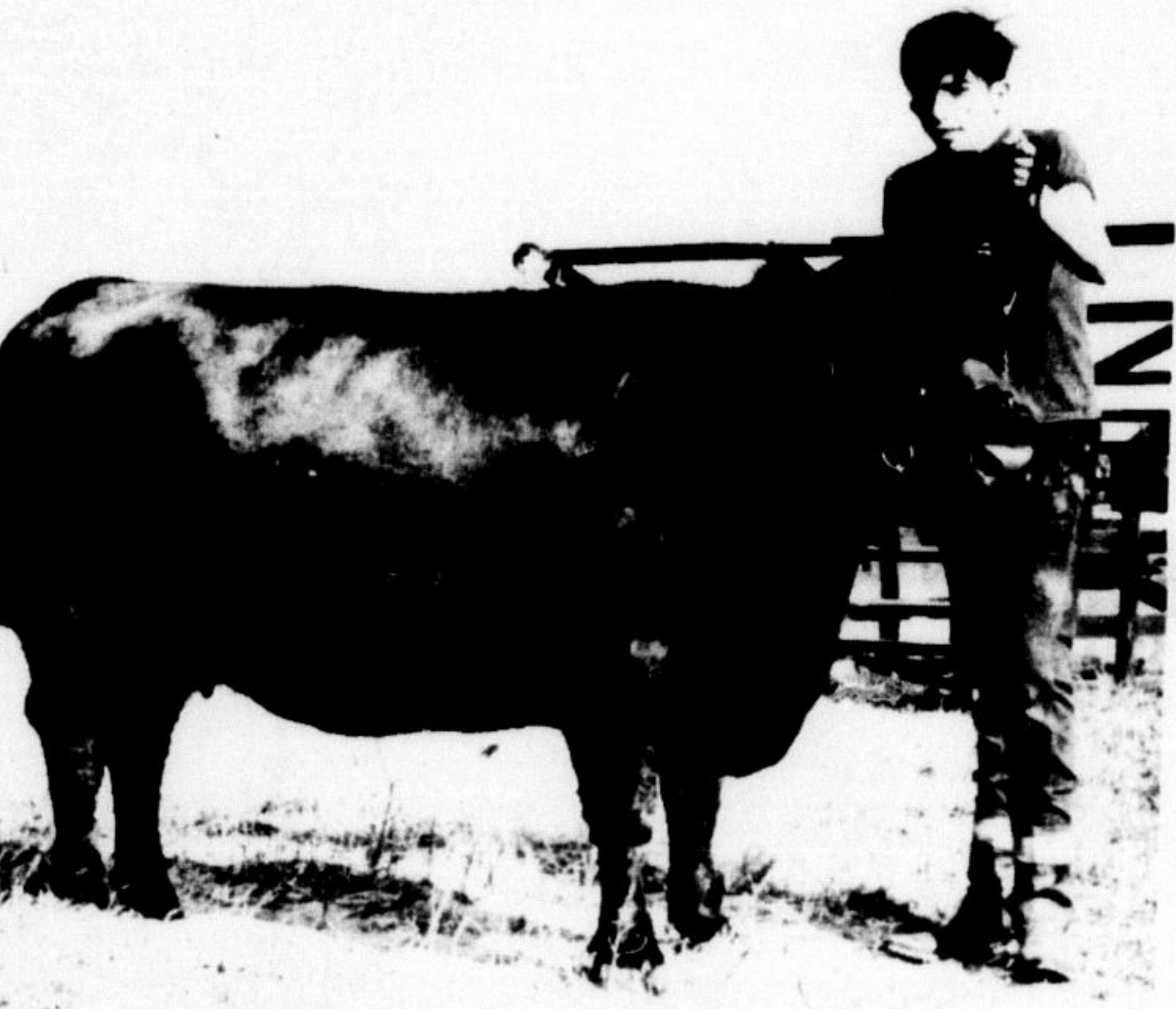
Advice is also available on species of trees, etc. Spruce and Cedar are the species used in the

majority of windbreaks. Carolina Poplar or Scotch Pine are often added because of their rapid growth. Black Locust is one of the best trees to plant to hold eroding clay slopes.

Trees cost \$10 per thousand, with the exception of Scotch Pine which are \$14. Approximately 1,000 trees are required per acre. Anyone owning over two acres can obtain these trees.

Hogs

Ed Snow, R. R. 5 Milton was top exhibitor in the swine contest at Milton Fair. Judge G. B. Crow awarded his hogs three firsts, three seconds and two thirds. Mr. Snow also showed the champion sow and reserve, and the best pen of bacon hogs. The only other competitor was J. A. Kelly, Elora who won a first, a second and a third.

Guernseys

J. M. McCullough of Acton was premier breeder and Dr. R. D. Kunica of R. R. 2, Georgetown was premier exhibitor in the Guernsey show held at Milton Fair.

Grand champion cow and best uddered female were both entries of L. S. Pickering, Oakville. John Y. McNabb of Georgetown shows the top breeder's herd. There were just the four exhibitors this year.

Herefords

Six exhibitors entered Hereford competitions in the show ring at Milton Fair.

William B. Arnold, New Lowell showed the champion female and won a first, a second and four thirds in competition. Reserve was a cow entered by F. Hustler, R. R. 2 Streetsville, and he also won a second prize ribbon.

In the bull competition, the champion came from C. F. Patterson, R. R. 2 Norval. Patterson also claimed two firsts, a second and a third. Reserve was shown by James McCarthy, R. R. 3 Georgetown who also won two firsts and a third.

Graham and Evelyn Gillies, R. R. 1 Milton won two firsts, two seconds and a third. Cecil McCann, R. R. 4 Milton claimed a second and a third.

Shorthorns

Reford W. Gardhouse, R. R. 5 Milton claimed five firsts and three second prizes on his Shorthorn entries at Milton Fair this year. The Gardhouse herd included the champion bull and reserve, and the reserve champion female.

John McKinnon, R. R. 3 Milton showed the champion cow. He also claimed one first, three seconds and two thirds.

Light horses

R. 3 Brampton won a first and a third; Howard Ella and Son of Woodbridge earned a third; Douglas Delaney of R. R. 3 Acton won a second and third; Wray Stirling of R. R. 9 Dunville won a first; Garnet Cochrane of Myrtle Station won a second and J. H. Taylor of R. R. 2 Burlington won a third prize.

Races

Three trials of speed were run off around the oval track at the fair grounds during Milton Fair, with several local horses and drivers competing for \$700 in prize money.

Ivy Who owned by Bill Peelo of Milton and driven by Andy Avery of Milton won both heats in the non-winners \$400 trot. In the non-winners \$400 pace, D. D. Dillon was top horse, coming third in the first heat and first in the final heat. The horse is

owned by G. and W. Atkinson, Fergus and was driven by W. E. Atkinson.

In the classified pace race, Soapstone owned by Mrs. G. Avery of Milton and driven by Andy Avery was the top horse, coming first in the initial heat and second in the final.

Angus

Four Angus farms competed for laurels in the Angus classes at Milton Fair.

Tom Jackson and Sons, Mono Road showed the champion bull and won two firsts, five seconds and three thirds in the competition. Entries of J. H. Willmott and Sons, R. R. 1 Milton included the champion female and reserve plus four firsts and a second.

Badenoch Farms Ltd., Puslinch showed the reserve champion bull and took home a first and two third prize ribbons. Ron Wilson and Sons, R. R. 2 Rockwood claimed a second and a third. Cyril G. Cook was judge.

Sheep

There was good competition in the sheep show at Milton Fair, with 10 exhibitors taking home dozens of prize ribbons on several breeds of sheep.

J. A. Kelly, R. R. 2 Elora showed the grand champion ram and won five firsts, three seconds, four thirds and four fourths. Grand champion ewe was an entry of Fred Gurney, Paris and he also won six firsts, a second and a third.

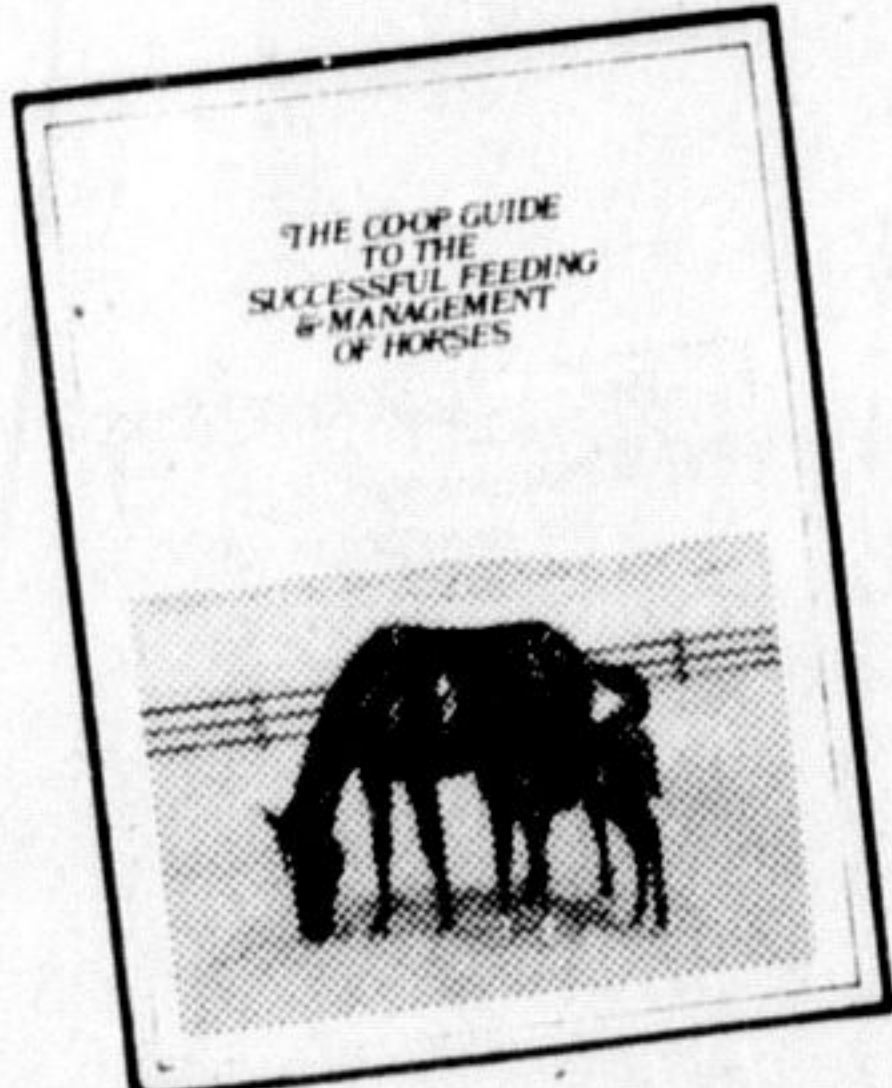
Reserve champion ram came from Gerald Comfort, St. Ann's. He also won seven firsts, six seconds. The reserve ewe was shown by H. Cooper of Smithville who won five firsts, 11 seconds, six thirds and two fourths.
