

Ambulance service busy on Thanksgiving Monday

The Milton Ambulance Service was fairly busy again this week with nine calls to handle. The first of the week was a transfer to Burlington on Oct. 7 at 7:12 p.m.

An accident on Highway 401 involving six injuries near Campbellville called out the ambulance at 2 p.m. The unit responded to a house call at Speyside on Saturday, Oct. 11 at 4:30 p.m. and they handled another house call at 12 a.m. on Martin St., Sunday morning. Another house call at 5:28 p.m. saw the service being used once again.

Thanksgiving Monday was a busy time for the service, starting off with a 6 a.m. house call, a 2 p.m. house call, a 4 p.m. transfer from Milton to Burlington and a 6:30 p.m. house call from Moffat.

Council postpones decision on land separation request

At their regular meeting on Monday, Oct. 6, Esqueping Council decided to refer to their solicitor a request by F. David Thompson for a land separation and then discuss the matter with a full Council present before making a decision. Reeve George Currie was absent from the meeting, which was chaired by deputy-reeve Tom Hill.

Mr. Thompson told Council that he is interested in purchasing land from a neighbor Bruce Frame and that he and Mr. Frame were willing to draw up an agreement on who would maintain the right of way and at no time in the future would

Council be asked to maintain the road.

Mr. Thompson presented his request to committee of adjustment last week, but the committee was unable to come to a decision on the matter and passed it on to Council.

Recently Council agreed that if committee of adjustment were ever undecided about whether to allow persons to build houses on unmaintained township roads they should send a representative to council and the two bodies would come to a decision between themselves.

On the subject of whether Council should make an immediate decision on the matter, councillor Russell Miller said, "I'm not against this, but I would like to see it discussed with a full Council, when the Reeve is here."

Councillor Ken Marshall added that he thought Council should seek the advice of their solicitor in case the property ever changed hands.

It's open house all next week at Milton Curling Club, and new members are invited out each evening to try their hand at the roaring game. Schedules begin Oct. 27.

Flashing light called for 'before someone gets killed'

For the second time in five months, two potentially dangerous road hazards were criticized by Nassagaweya Council at their meeting last Monday night.

The hazards rapped by council were the lack of flashing warning lights at two road intersections in the township.

The first intersection at the corner of Guelph Line and 15 Sideroad, was the reason for a petition by township residents, in May, who were requesting something to be done about the corner. Councillor Art Gibson

said, "Do we have to have somebody killed before we get a light at Haltonville corner?"

The second hazard mentioned by council was the intersection of Eden Mills Sideroad and the Guelph Line. One councillor noted cars had driven right through the dead-end intersection and had ended up in a farmer's field. A flashing caution light was also requested for this corner.

Reeve Anna MacArthur told council she would bring the matter up immediately with the county roads committee.

Will report on deaf olympics at Association meeting tonight

People who participated in and supported the Halton and Peel Association for the Hearing Handicapped in their swimathon and walkathon fund-raising drives earlier this year, will be able to hear a good report on where the money went tonight (Wednesday) in Milton.

Hallie Bryant of Belleville and teacher Dennis Snider of O.S.D. Milton, who coached the track and volleyball teams of deaf students and adults who participated in the World Olympics for the Deaf in Yugoslavia during August, will be on hand at the Association's first fall meeting to give a report on the trip.

The Halton and Peel group raised \$8,500 toward the \$40,000 cost of sending the Canadian delegation to Belgrad, thanks to the generous public support of their swimathon and walkathon. Many high school students in Acton and Milton were on the 32-mile walk to help raise the funds, and many students and adults supported

O.S.D. swimmers in their swimathon.

At tonight's meeting Mr. Bryant and Mr. Snider will talk on the trip and show pictures and movies of the Canadian delegation at the Olympics. The meeting starts at 8 p.m. and will be held in the Junior School auditorium at O.S.D. Milton. A special invitation is extended to the general public, and especially those who helped the Association raise the money.

12 inch main on Main St. to third line

Installation of a 12-inch water line on Main St., east of Ontario St. to the Third Line, was approved in three readings of a by-law by Milton Council.

The project, estimated at \$86,468, will be on a local improvement basis with the town share estimated at \$50,174 and the property owners' share at \$36,294.

The by-law will spread the cost of the work over a 10 year period.

While a 12-inch main is being installed the property owners are being charged only on the basis of their requirements for a six-inch line.

All the property owners involved petitioned for the work.

David Hunter listed 'fair'

David Hunter, the 20-year-old Milton man involved in the fatal accident on Highway 401 last weekend, is listed as being in fair condition and conscious in the intensive care ward of the Hamilton General Hospital.

Another Milton youth, 18-year-old Ted Hood, was killed in the same accident after the car he was riding in, driven by Hunter, collided with an almost stopped pickup truck on the highway.

The driver of the truck, 45-year-old Walter Millinger of Wroxeter, has since been charged by the OPP.

Robert Burt rejoins staff

Robert Burt returns to The Champion news staff this week, after a nine month stint as sports editor of the Northern Daily News at Kirkland Lake.

A graduate of Algonquin Community College journalism school at Ottawa, Bob spent almost two years with The Champion in 1967 and 1968, then resigned to accept the post at the daily paper in northern Ontario last January.

Bob will again be handling sports and general news writing for The Champion. He replaces Larry Martin, who has left The Champion.

P.L. Robertson moves office back to town

After moving its head office staff to an office and warehouse in Rexdale three years ago, P. L. Robertson Manufacturing Co. Ltd. has moved it all back to Milton again.

Monday of last week the move was completed and the full Rexdale staff of over 100 has been relocated in the Milton plant and offices on Bronte St. Geoff Dreger, who is in charge of the Milton operation for Robertson said the move involved over 100 employees—about 75 in the office and around 25 in the warehouse.

Mr. Dreger said the advantages of having their head office and main plant in one location far

outweighed having the office located in the city, so far from the main plant here in town.

The move actually started about four months ago. The week of July 15 the sales staff moved back to Milton from Rexdale and the big shift was completed last week when the accounting staff returned to Milton. The Rexdale operation is being phased out and should be closed by the end of this month.

Several of the firm's office staff from Milton travelled by bus to Rexdale during the past three years. Mr. Dreger said some had quit rather than

commute, and Rexdale residents were employed to replace them. Now some of the former Milton office workers are being engaged to replace the Rexdale residents who quit rather than move to Milton.

The firm has carried out extensive renovations to their Bronte St. offices and warehousing areas to accommodate the return of the staff.

Apple day

Buy an apple? That's the appeal this weekend as Milton's Cubs and Scouts tour the town in their annual Apple Day campaign. They'll be calling on homes and selling apples on the streets Friday and Saturday, to raise funds for Scouting projects.
