Player personnel is a problem besetting just about every hockey team in Ontari and the competition for players has never been keener. The problem rapidly surging towards a climax and there aren't too many hockey clubs that are not concerned.

At a recent meeting of the Northern Ontario Hockey Association, (a branch of the OHA) the problem of northern talent being raided by southern teams of Junior A and Junior B calibre took priority.

Northern minor hockey associations are bringing players along to the point where they can play and then when southern Junior clubs want the players they are not willing to pay what the northern clubs think is fair.

Even more aggravating to the northerners is the idea that the clubs are being consulted only after the player has been spoken to and is already excited about going on to something great and glorious in the southern ranks.

When the scout or team representative does get to the club he had an advantage because he has talked the youngster into going and he too is pressing for a release.

While the OHA Jr. A appears to be the villain in the northern part of the province, they too have problems and readily point their finger to the American colleges who come north with promises of hockey and an eduction too.

Add to that the increasing number of teams of Junior A, B and C classification and the problem is a real one. The Western Ontario Junior League (an outlaw league) can't help but be a problem as far as hurting Junior B and C teams. Before if a boy in a Junior C town wasn't good enough to play or get a substantial offer from a college after high school, he played on the hometown team and was happy to get a position.

You don't have to go any further than the Suburban Junior C Hockey League to experience the problem. Before the season started Milton Merchants expected 12 players of last year's club to return and form the nucleus of this year's club. As it happened about half that many actually returned for another year and the club is faced with a rebuilding job rather than rounding corners.

Several Junior B clubs have approached the Merchants for player releases. On one occasion releases were granted, but had the club granted all releases requested there would be no club . . . and it is as simple as that.

Rick Cole, Graham Hern and Paul Kitchen, all top rate players, left the ranks this year before their time was up in search of greener pastures. Hern went to Brandon, Manitoba, Cole to the new Junior A league and Kitchen went off to school at Troy, New York.

Gary Young will play Junior B hockey in Dixie and to further complicate the situation John Gagne, Steve Lawrence and Jim Chalkley all will be out of action as far as the Merchants go.

Gagne has decided not to commute any longer, Lawrence is in the league opener. teacher's college and doesn't have the time for hockey, and Chalkley has become Burlington property. While Chalkley has played here in other years and will not play anywhere until the McMaster football season is over, getting a release from the new Burlington team will be tough.

Even with all these problems the Merchants still are reasonably sure of coming up with a good contender, thanks to a healthy Milton Minor Hockey Association. Without that no club can produce.

While Milton's problems might seem grave they are only of a minor nature in relation to those of our great rivals in Georgetown. The Raiders have run into more than their fair share of problems.

Not only are they faced with the problems of players graduating to higher ranking clubs but four players from last year's club want to play Juvenile hockey rather than Junior in that town.

Milton organizers of course are concerned about the situation in Georgetown because for one, it is a close trip, and secondly because Georgetown rivalry has brought their best gates for years.

While Georgetown is doing everything possible to get a contender their problems are serious ones and the problems facing most other area clubs are and will continue to become serious.

In this and other parts of the province court battles have been threatened and in at least one instance they have gone to court. There has to be a solution some place.




