# Mobilize all forces for Tri-County wars

The word on Milton Minor Hockey teams is "go" this Sunday as all five clubs from Novice through Juvenile invade Chinguacousy for the first games of the season.

All five clubs of course will be looking for Tri-County championships and provincial honors this year. Juvenile coach Joe Auger expects to have a good club and a big year.

"It is too soon to tell but we should be solid on defence, strong in goal and forward too," Auger said. A lot of what happens with the Juveniles depends partly on who the Juniors take up.

Back from last year on defence are Dave Gates and Kirby Munro while Nigel Ferguson and Rick Gooding are both joining the club as centremen. Goalies Trevor Roberts and Terry Cole are expected to bolster the Juvenile defence this year.

The Juveniles won the Tri-County crown last year and were beaten out in the first round of the Ontario playoffs against Thornhill. Auger, who played professional hockey for Louisville in the Eastern Professional league, reports the spirit of the club is high and a good year lies ahead. They tied Oakville 1-1 in their only exhibition game.

Jim Murray, manager of the Midget club talks about the makings of a good contender in the Midget ranks this year. "We have a big club this year, bigger than other years," Murray said. The team's bright spot will be in the nets with Pat Devlin and Brad Evans, both top flight goalies.

While the forward lines are not settled yet Rich Murray has been centering for Greg Chuchmach and Dave Heipel and Phil Collen have been playing on a line with Harold Merry and Rick Jubb. Rick McTrach, Jim Sales and Jim Robertson have all seen action on forward lines in exhibition action.

Hugh Marshall and Bob Rusk have paired up on defence on one line and Steve Robertson and Kim Mountain have paired up on another line and the defence looks strong.

Others have shown well at practice and the coach and manager hope to have the club in shape for their opener Sunday. Jim Munro is coaching the club this year.

While coach Dance has made all the cuts necessary and things look good for the Bantams, they will be set back a little because of the absence due to illness of promising Rick Bridgman.

Bridgman was a standout with the Pee Wees in the past few seasons but will miss the first month of action this year due to an appendicitis operation Friday.

Second year men on defence will be Wade Bekar, George

Hood and Mark Grenke. Glen Turner will return to the club this year as number one goalie. Gary Gooding and Kerry Kitchen return to the Bantam forward lines and newcomer Scott McKenzie has good potential to help the club.

Bill Rowney returns as team manager, Murray McConnell joins the club as assistant coach and Sid Dance will be club trainer. They went to the Ontario Semi-Finals last year.

The Pee Wees battled to a 6-2 win over Burlington and a 4-4 tie with Guelph over the weekend. They played last night in Burlington and tonight in Guelph and swing into league play Sunday.

Coach Ted Kennedy is optimistic about the Pee Wees' immediate future. "We'll give it

a good shot," Kennedy said. With Craig Jubb in goal and Ron Twiss and Brent Murray on defence posts, they should be good defensively. Bruce Ellison, Paul Sproat and John Tonelli are back from last year on the forward line and should be tough.

The club has a rough tradition to follow after going to the Ontario semi-finals a year ago and the finals last year. Bob Rollins will assist Kennedy in coaching the club and Don Wilson is club manager.

Bob Collen will handle the Novice club instead of Pee Wees this year. The club will be managed by Jim Smith. Collen said the boys were skating five nights a week at hockey school but had not been out to a Novice practice yet.

## Scannell misses bid finishes in 4th spot

Over 5,000 fans saw what was easily the best racing program ever staged at Flamboro Speedway Saturday night. Forty super-modified and 30 late model race cars put on quite a battle for \$15,000 in prize money.

The big story was that of Milton's Howie Scannell, the 1969 track champion in the late model division. Scannell took over the wheel of Norm Morton's super-modified and came within one lap of winning the \$2,500 first prize which went to the winner of the STP 100 lap feature. Instead, through a lapped car which couldn't get out of his way in time, Scannell had to settle for fourth place and \$850.

Scannell won the first qualifying heat and started the 100 lap race in pole position. He quickly grabbed the lead but Warren Coniam and Norm Mackereth stayed right on his back bumper for 72 laps until Mackereth had to retire to the pits. Ollie Silva of Haverhill, Mass., then moved into the third spot and one of North America's top drivers, Bentley Warren of Gloucester, Mass. took fourth spot with the famous "Purdy Ducee". Warren passed Silva on the 78th lap and for the next 21 laps the first four cars ran bumper to bumper.

Just as Scannell passed the starter's stand with one lap to go he came upon Bob Seelman and Ken Andrews who were fighting for 14th spot and was boxed in. Coniam quickly found a hole on the low side and slipped through to take the lead. Scannell in sheer desperation went way high around the two cars but went into the corner much too fast and slid into the fence. By the time he recovered, both Warren

and Silva had gone by and he had to settle for fourth place.

For Coniam who drives the "Rutledge Rocket" out of Toronto it was the second major victory at Flamboro 5th season. He had pocketed \$1,000 for a 100 lap victory earlier in the year. Bentley Warren of Gloucester, Mass. placed second for \$1,500, Ollie Silva of Haverhill, Mass., took third for \$1,000, Scannell was fourth for \$850 and the previous night's \$2,500 winner at the Delaware International Speedway, Jack Conely of Brighton, Mich. took fifth for \$650. Harold Brown of Brantford finished a very commendable ninth for \$405.

Scannell drove his familiar 1969 Dodge in the Late Model Division but again had to settle for fourth position. The 35-lap feature race went to a driver from Pinecrest Speedway, Jack Cook of Toronto with Don Biederman of Port Credit second. Biederman has purchased Harold Brown's 1966 Chevelle and with Biederman's big 427 cubic inch Chev engine it ran quicker than anything on the track. Earl Ross of London took third spot with Scannell fourth and Harvey Walsh of Brantford fifth.
