With the sudden passing of Ted Hood in his fifth and final year at Milton High, everyone began to recall his most memorable remarks in class and his greatest plays on the football field, although Ted had received his greatest recognition as a Junior hockey star in Milton. His popularity around the school was great and the many empty seats in last Tuesday afternoon's classes were representative of how we all felt.
The school has also been praying for Dave Hunter, a former student of M.D.H.S. and son of Mr. Hunter our principal. Dave received serious injuries in the tragic crash of Oct. 4 and is wished a fast and full recovery by everyone at Milton High.

The girls' basketball teams, both junior and senior, have begun their hectic schedule once again. The teams with new faces present have not experienced victory as of yet as the juniors lost 41-16 and the seniors were dropped 45-14. Thursday the Seniors were defeated by a somewhat similar score while the Juniors failed 29-18 against White Oaks.
With Tuesday's game being postponed until Thursday the Junior Mustangs were given a great chance to work out their new backfield, which resulted in a surprising 16-15 victory over the Blakelock Tabbies. The game, the first on our brand new field was a must for Milton, however a victory seemed far off as Blakelock had won the league opener against the Mustangs by a score of 20-0.
The defense once again was the backbone of the team as Larry Beaulieu found a stray

pass from the Tabbie quarterback falling into his arms and swept into the end zone for the first Mustang T.D. The conversion was made by Stan Thomas in his first game as a Mustang Q.B. The offense then turned to the toe of Pete Roberts for two singles, mounting the count to 9-0.
At that point in the game the Tabbies took over with two touchdowns on long pass and run plays along with a two point conversion and a single, leaving the Mustangs behind 15-9. As time began to run out in the fourth quarter a blocked punt by John Zanatta changed the Milton bench from a solemn location to a whooping scene. From the Tabbie 30 yard line a pitch to Pete Roberts resulted in the tying touchdown. The conversion was missed leaving the score 15-15.
Another blocked punt left the

Mustangs in tremendous field position with three minutes remaining. In a first and 10 situation Stan Thomas surprised the Tabbies with a quick kick, resulting in the winning point. Milton is now involved in a hairy three way tie for second place with a home and home series with undefeated Perdue Panthers this Tuesday (at Perdue) and Thursday (in Milton) taking place before the final game against White Oaks Wildcats.
Football is now an epidemic at Milton High as the Seniors begin to practise as a result of constant plugging by Paul Perrott who is fast becoming "Mr. Football". With our goalposts being painted blue and white and our Student Council outfitting the senior club, the school is bubbling over with spirit, soon to be conveyed to the gymnasium bleachers during the often riotous basketball contests.

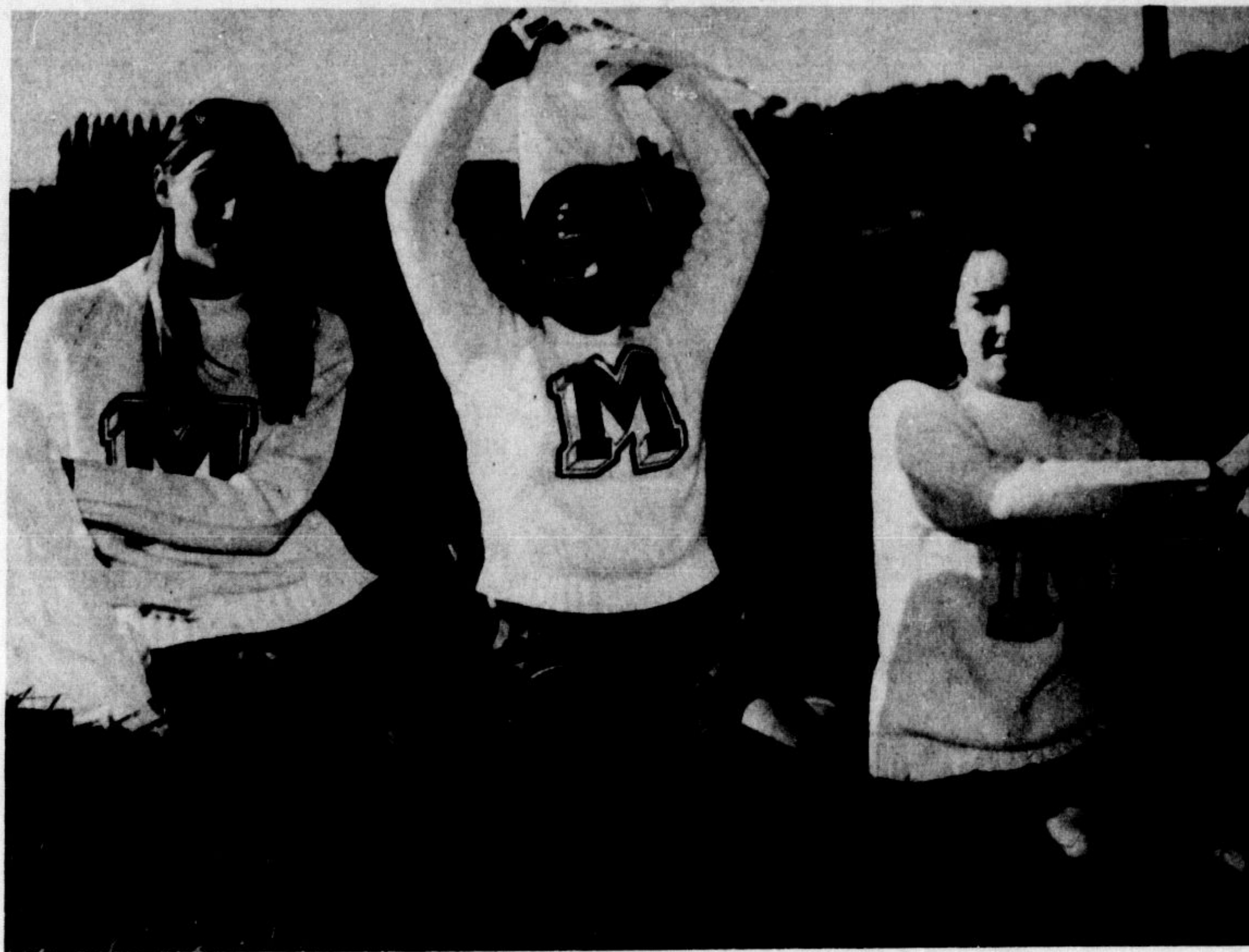
Joggers running for 1,000 mile awards
