

Awards, certificates, bursaries are presented

Students and recent graduates of Milton District High School gathered at the school Friday evening as hundreds of awards, certificates and bursaries were presented to deserving students during the annual commencement exercises.

United Steelworkers' bursaries from local 4970 amounting to \$25 each were given to Michael Svilans with 84 per cent and Karin Sorensen with 84 per cent. The awards are given to students with the highest standings in Industrial Arts and Home Economics in grade 10.

Karin Sorensen also won the Harris Stationery prize as the highest standing in grade 10 commercial subjects. Karin had 87 per cent and won \$50. Other grade 10 students to receive awards were Lydia Rentenaar with 84.3 per cent, for highest standing in grade 10 English. The award, a book, is given by the Campbellville Women's Institute.

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Three Ontario scholars from MDHS grad class

Nearly 250 proud parents watched their children receive awards and diplomas at Milton District High School's commencement exercises Friday evening. Included in those graduates were three Ontario scholars, Inge Jensen, Kenneth Brown and Robert Hadley.

Guest speaker for the evening was George M. Hood, vice-president and general manager of Ontario Steel Products Ltd., Milton. In his address, Mr. Hood told the audience Canadian youth as a whole is composed of fine young people. He urged businessmen to bring this youth into the field of business and in turn told the graduates, "There's plenty of action in business."

"Even though you have to adhere to a commonly accepted code of behaviour and dress, this does not imply there also has to be intellectual sameness as well," he said.

Mr. Hood told the gathering that making a profit is the prime responsibility the business world has to society. He also urged the graduates, as well as the other students present, to "persevere in all you do and acquire a reputation for reliability."

In his remarks, the school's vice-principal William Tom complimented the graduating class for their work and told

them that while approximately 30 per cent of the average number of high school graduates went on to obtain a higher education, Milton District High School had 52 per cent of its graduates going on to further their education.

Valedictorian Kenneth Brown in his address credited the teachers with a lot of his and his fellow student's success. "The teachers should share the spotlight with us now," he said. He recalled memories of his first year of high school in the old high school which is now Martin Street Senior Public School.

The valedictorian then

addressed his remarks to the radicals of the high school and told them "this school is only what you make it."
