Objections to zoning by-law to be considered in detail

A detailed consideration of 20 objections to the town's zoning by-law was initiated by Milton Council last week before the objections are submitted to the Ontario Municipal Board.

Council took no action on the objection lodged by Yvonne Christie and William Woods regarding land on the east side of Bronte St. The objection was to the Development zone designation. An R6 zone was requested.

On a recorded vote council took no action on the objection of 27 property owners on Pine St. to the projections that Pine St. would eventually be an 86 foot wide street rather than the present 66 foot width.

Councillor Charles Fay opposed the proposed 86 foot width, shown in the by-law. He suggested the widening projected would only be for parking and he was opposed to widening streets for parking. "Why not go

to one way streets?" he

Councillor G. Krantz pointed out it could be 20 years before the street was 86 feet wide but the adoption of the plan indicates an intent to any who build there.

Mayor Best observed the street width pattern was a part of the Official Plan that had already received council's approval, but because council had requested its reference to the Ontario Municipal Board objections could be heard from ratepayers when the OMB hearing is scheduled.

All members voted in favor of taking no action on the objection with the exception of Councillor Fay.

Proposals by Oakview Developments to have land behind the shopping centre zoned R7 rather than D was not acted on, as was a similar request from Milton Industrial Parks.


