Besides her regular work, Miss Chapman travelled around the province giving lectures and demonstrations in home economics, both to farm ladies and their daughters. Miss Scott said, "Miss Chapman had that certain talent for breaking through the generation gap and

He said there were a total of 96 blind people in Halton County and out of this total, 21 were between the ages of one to 16. Milton has 12 registered blind people, Acton seven, Burlington 43, Georgetown 12 and Oakville 22. He went on to say many are also

These people are not completely blind and yet they have only enough vision to be able to read or see with specially ground lenses. There is a special clinic for people with low vision in Toronto, he said, and he gave several examples of how blind people or people with low vision are able to lead normal lives.
