Ticket sales at CP station will cease on Monday, Dec. 1

The Milton Canadian Pacific Railway Station will close down its ticket selling operations Monday, Dec. 1, but the building will remain open for the convenience of passengers who have to wait for their train.

After that date, tickets will be sold either on the train or through travel agencies in this area. Ticket agent for the Milton station, C. M. Honsinger, has been transferred to Chatham where he will work as a train operator. In this job, he is responsible for making up trains

and issuing engineers their orders.

The assistant agent, Bert Churchill has been transferred to CP Rail's central London office.

The mobile supervisor for the Milton area will be Murray Regis, a Milton resident who works out of the Streetsville CP Rail office. He will be responsible for customer services for much of the central part of Halton County.

Mr. Honsinger, besides taking up his new job as train operator, will also serve as a relief mobile supervisor.

Apt. complex gets permit

The Town of Milton issued just three building permits during October but one was issued at a value of over half a million dollars.

It was issued to Toreeta Corporation for an 87-suite Ontario St. apartment complex valued at \$676,000. The second permit was for a residence repair and was valued at \$3,000 while the third permit issued was for the construction of a garage valued at \$650.

To date this year the town has issued \$2,746,409 worth of construction permits.

REPORT

During the week ending Nov. 8, officers of Milton detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police worked a total of 1058½ hours and patrolled 9,624 miles of road under their jurisdiction. Traffic violation resulted in 53 persons being summoned for court appearance and an additional 19 were warned for minor driving errors. Convictions were registered against 88 persons.

General occurrences reported for investigation numbered 39, during this time. Included in this number were: six thefts, one break and enter, four complaints of wilful damage, one prowler complaint, three premises were found insecure during the night, two complaints of hunters trespassing and one additional investigation of a trespasser resulted in a charge being laid under the Petty Trespass Act. There were three investigations under the Liquor Control Act which resulted in three persons being charged. One stolen car was recovered for another police department and one impaired driver was apprehended. Other occurrences were of minor nature requiring little investigative time.

A motor vehicle accident claimed the life of one person this week and resulted in injuries to another person. There were 16 other accidents, 12 of which resulted in property damage in

which totaled approximately \$7,970. Cause of the collisions were: careless driving, failing to yield the right of way, failing to obey stop signs, impaired driving, and unsafe turns. As a result of the investigation 11 charges were laid and two others are pending apprehension of hit and run motorists.

Provincial Constable Tom Penrice gave safety talks at Glen Williams Public School, Norval Public School, Campbellville Public School speaking to a total of approximately 444 children.

Car quits, burns

A minor trouble call turned into a fire call for a Brampton man whose car broke down on Highway 401 outside Milton Monday evening, Nov. 10.

According to police and firefighters, Len A. McNair of Brampton was driving along the highway when his car quit, just east of the Highway 25 overpass. He walked to the Milton OPP station a quarter of a mile away to enlist some aid. Returning to the car, he found it had caught fire in the wiring around the motor—probably due to a short circuit caused by the dampness.

Milton police quarterly figs.

Milton police have issued their quarterly report for the months of July to the end of September and they report a total number of 881 occurrences during the period.

There were no fatal accidents within the town boundaries but personal and other injuries totalled 27. Thirty-two accidents totalled over \$100 each in damage while 15 accidents saw under \$100 damage done, bringing the total amount of damage to \$15,960. Fifty-six properties were

found to be insecure and 187 persons were given warnings by the police. A total of 267 summonses and warrants were issued and 402 charges were laid by the police.

Two hundred and twenty-four motorists were summoned under the Highway Traffic Act and 76 parking violations were recorded.

Property stolen during the period totalled \$2,776.86 and police recovered \$1,071.18 worth of property.
