Milton police have issued their quarterly report for the months of July to the end of September and they report a total number of 881 occurrences during the period.

There were no fatal accidents within the town boundaries but personal and other injuries totalled 27. Thirty-two accidents totalled over \$100 each in damaged while 15 accidents saw under \$100 damage done, bringing the total amount of damage to \$15,960.

Fifty-six properties were

found to be insecure and 187 persons were given warnings by the police. A total of 267 summonses and warrants were issued and 402 charges were laid by the police.

Two hundred and twenty-four motorists were summonsed under the Highway Traffic Act and 76 parking violations were recorded.
