

After Bob Kane scored three of Newmarket's five goals in a 5-4 win over the Merchants here Friday night, it seemed as if all the Merchants would have to do would be to take care of Kane and a victory over the hottest team in Eastern Division would result.



While this should by all means of measure be six points for the Merchants, it will be three games without the keen competition the club will need to get sharp.


