Esquering approves Limehouse dragstrip

"You can come and watch the races from my bedroom window", was the parting invitation of one of the close to 75 Esquering township residents who jammed the township council chamber Friday night to protest the establishment of the Golden Horseshoe Dragway between the Fifth and Sixth Lines.

Esquering council had just resolved, by a 4-1 recorded vote to approve the issue of a building permit for a control tower for the dragway to promoter Carl Bristow.

Councillor Russell Miller cast the lone vote against the resolution. Voting in favor were

reeve George Currie, deputy-reeve Tom Hill, and councillors Wilfrid Leslie and Ken Marshall.

Jubilant about council's decision, Mr. Bristow said he'd have racing started sometime between the middle of May and the first of June. Drag racing enthusiasts from the area will be permitted to race their cars, provided they first pass a rigid inspection.

Permanent seating for about 5,000 spectators is planned. Obviously disappointed by the result, Peter Bowman, spokesman for the protesting residents, promised to take court action.

"We've lost the first skirmish but the battle is far from over", Mr. Bowman's wife Jacqueline said.

Lights were up but no help

The soon-to-be-operating traffic lights at the corner of Main and Ontario Sts. were erected but not working Saturday when two cars collided at the intersection.

Damage to one car, driven by Antonio Della-Rocca of Oakville, was set at \$150 while damage to the second car involved in the mishap, owned and driven by Duncan Graham of Mississauga, was listed at \$200.

Campbellville needs Scout troop leader

Several boys in Campbellville urgently need a Scout leader. Too old to remain in Cubs yet eager to remain with the Scouting movement, the boys will have no place to go if someone doesn't soon volunteer to head up a Scout troop.

Cubmaster Mrs. Lloyd Bayley told The Champion she has been trying to line up a Scout leader for over a year. Right now there are five or six boys ready to move up to Scouts, and another dozen or so will be ready in the next few months, but "they have no place to go and I hate to turn them out."

"We're pretty desperate," she added. "I have tried everybody I know but I just can't find a man willing to take on the job."

Mrs. Bayley explains the job entails one night a week plus some weekend time for Scout get-togethers, camping and hiking programs. The Burlington headquarters will provide free training for the new leader. "All we need is someone to supervise and guide the boys—they should run their own show," she points out.

A hall has been reserved for the group's meetings but without a leader to guide them, a lot of keen Scout prospects in Campbellville and district are going to have to leave the Scouting movement. Any volunteers can contact Mrs. Bayley or group committee chairman LeRoy Wood or vice-chairman Joe Ferrier.

By-law resolutions approved by council

In a brief meeting of Milton Council Monday, members passed several resolutions affecting the objections to the town's zoning by-law and official plan, prior to the Ontario Municipal Board hearing which began the following day.

Objections of Oakview Developments and Milton Industrial Parks were to be withdrawn after council gave assurance it would consider plans of subdivision which would include multi-family developments in the area of the shopping plaza and the former Court St. bus factory.

Objections of the Petroleum Association of Ontario and Sun Oil Co. Ltd. were also reduced after assurances consideration would be given to a new definition for a service station which would clarify the outside storage limitations. Consideration was also to be given the extent of a planting strip required where a station borders a residential lot. The size of rear yards for service stations was also to be reconsidered.

Council also withdrew its plan to widen Pine St. to 88 feet and reverted to 66 feet in response to objections from residents.

Firefighters hold debate on boundaries

Boundary lines of Halton's fire departments and the effects regional government might have on the present boundaries were discussed at the January meeting of Halton Mutual Aid Firefighting Service last week.

A technical co-ordinating committee including all five Halton fire chiefs is currently studying possible future fire boundaries for a county-wide committee which is making plans for regional government.

There was a poor attendance at the January meeting of Mutual Aid—many of the firefighters were off sick. Secretary Rick Burgin, Burlington has resigned from his post and a new secretary is to be named at the group's next meeting.

Form Irish-Canadian Club first dance is successful

Another group has joined the ranks of Milton's hyphenated-name clubs. First it was the German-Canadians who organized a social group for themselves, then the Dutch-Canadians followed suit and about a year ago the Italian-Canadians joined the trend.

Now Milton has a club for those of Irish origin—the "Milton and District Irish-Canadian Social Club"—which held its first dance earlier this month, complete with an Irish show band for entertainment.

Frank Lee of Pine St. organized the new group and is serving as its president. Vice-president is Nip Maskell, secretary-treasurer Cliff Gelant, and directors Pat Callan and Charlie Cairns.

"I've been organizing this since last St. Patrick's Day," says Frank, the friendly Irishman. He used to head up a Carlton Show band fan club here in town, which had a membership that

was half Irish and half everything else. The fan club folded up and local supporters are now throwing their support behind a new Irish show band group, the Kevin Malloy Show Band.

Mr. Malloy is a former soloist from Ireland who sang professionally as "The Minstrel Boy". Now his six-man show band, based in Toronto, is touring the country playing for dances. They performed at the Irish-Canadian Club's first social outing on Jan. 17 and are expected back for a (what else?) St. Patrick's Day Dance on March 21.

There was a full house crowd of about 180 on hand to welcome their debut in Milton at the Holy Rosary Hall on the 17th and the band was warmly accepted by the dancers—they were so popular they wouldn't let the band off the stage, says President Lee.

Club membership now stands at around 200 and the president says proceeds from their social outings will be put in a fund to help expand the dance floor area at Holy Rosary Hall.
