"He was a great friend of ours and just one hell of a fine guy. He helped us out of many a crises," commented Al Parton, Merchant manager.

Jim Murray filled many roles in the sports community and did all his jobs justice. Minor hockey in Milton has become a strong body because of people like him. He'll be long remembered in Milton's sports circles.




