Mr. Whiting suggested an amendment to Bill-137 to evolve around a limitation of horsepower for public automobiles as an added safety measure on our highways.

Whiting criticized admitting fewer than 15 per cent high powered cars. "Hardly a day goes by when someone is not brought into our hospital because of an accident due to drivers who may be careless or unthinking, or whose vehicle may be mechanically defective,"

Later in his address he explained, "In my opinion we do not need faster cars; we need safer cars and safer drivers. The driving public must be educated to realize that the vehicle he drives can be one of two things. In the hands of a responsible person a car can be highly efficient and most pleasant means of transportation. In a split second it can become a weapon of death and destruction."


