

Winter break swim program approved

The indoor winter break swim program will be continued this year, members of the Milton Parks and Recreation Committee agreed Wednesday after receiving approval from the Ontario School for the Deaf.

The five day free swim program attracted between 500 and 600 during the winter school vacation last year, at the Ontario School for the Deaf pool. Tickets for the two daily one hour periods are sold in advance.

The Committee also met with the executive of the Youth-on-the-Move organization to review programs, club structure, progress and arrange for periodic meetings with the Recreation Committee. The executive reported 129 members in the organization and plans for future events.

Interest in a badminton club for senior teens and adults will be explored. Following indications of interest. The Committee agreed to arrange facilities for a badminton night which would be open to those who might be interested in forming a local club. Costs of the initial meeting are to be underwritten by the Recreation Committee and the date announced.

The committee took no further action on lacrosse when it received a letter from Milton Arena Board indicating use of the arena for the sport would require about \$2,000 in fencing and the addition of exhausting equipment. It was also pointed out the summer months are generally used for maintenance work.

The Recreation Committee had written late last year for information on the availability of the arena if interest in lacrosse warranted formation of a league.

Members reviewed the recreation committee budget, comparing actual expenditures with last year's budget. It was noted that while pool admissions had increased to \$5,100 the costs of salaries and supplies for the pool had been \$8,300. Pool repairs had added a further \$4,219. Costs of operating the summer playground and day camp program were \$5,208.

A joint meeting was to be arranged with the Arena Board to review the possibility of locating a future arena site in the north east neighborhood which is currently being planned. A reply from the two boards is expected by council before March 4.

Procedural rules force second meeting

Halton County Board of Education trustees got fouled up in their own procedural rules at their regular meeting Thursday. By their constitution they must receive a two thirds majority in a vote to continue any meeting beyond 11 p.m.

Thursday when Chairman Doug Wood called the vote many of the members failed to respond to the question. Only nine hands were counted and 14 are needed to continue. As the

vote was called a program council finished their presentation and left the room and in the confusion many members weren't aware the vote had been called.

When Chairman Doug Wood proceeded to call for a second vote Burlington trustee Fred Armitage raised a point of order and after much deliberation it was decided that not only could they not continue the meeting, but they could not go into

committee of the whole. Because the meeting agenda carried several items that had to be dealt with a special meeting had to be slated for Friday at 7.30, much to the consternation of several members.

Trustee John Ronson suggested they continue with must items and leave the rest to next meeting. "I find this somewhat ridiculous and I feel we should deal with the matters at hand now. This should be done, not as a procedural thing but as simply a practical one." His suggestion brought support from several members.

Vice-chairman Bill Priestner

suggested to ignore procedure now would cause chaos at some later date. Trustee Harold Thorpe noted the legislation said the next meeting would be at the call of the chairman and he wondered if they could adjourn and meet again at 11.15 at the call of the chair.

Debate continued for a few minutes before the second meeting was scheduled for 7.30 the following night. On his way out of the room trustee Bruce Edwards retorted, "I hope all those who voted against continuing show up tomorrow night." Sixteen attended the Friday night meeting.

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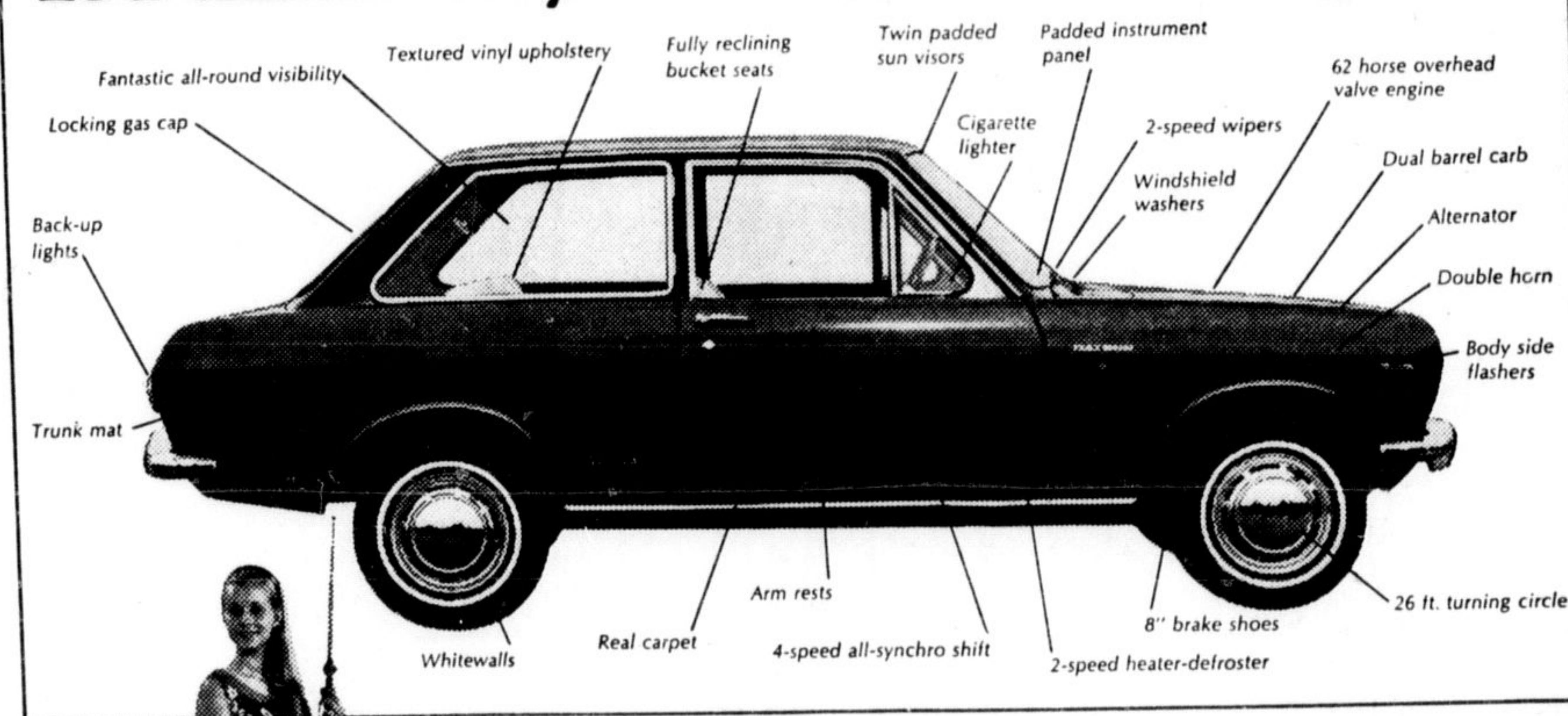
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
