Prompt brigade saves area barn, industry

Prompt action by firefighters resulted in saving a large barn and a small industrial building, in two fires during the past

Sunday afternoon fire broke out in straw stored in a barn on the former Cowan farm on Lower Base Line Rd., mjust east of Highway 25. Although the fire was in the area patrolled by Oakville Fire Department, the Milton brigade was also called and they arrived at the scene first. The two brigades worked together and thanks to a plentiful supply of water in a nearby pond, soon had the

at one end of the barn. "We would have lost it, if it hadn't been for that pond," said Milton Fire Chief A. E. Clement. It was impossible to see through the dense smoke so firefighters trained high pressure lines on the straw and literally blew the fire out-right out the open side of the barn where it was easier to douse the smouldering straw.
