## North Halton reassessment

Do you know the market value of your home or farm?

Residents of North Halton may know more accurately following the visits of teams of assessors into Acton, Milton, Georgetown, Esquesing and Nassagaweya in late fall or the early part of next year.

Halton-Peel assessment commissioner R. H. Beach told this newspaper at a press conference in Brampton Monday that teams of 21 men would move into the various North Halton municipalities following the reassessment program in Brampton. He expected this would take up most of this year, but it was quite possible work would start in North Halton in the late fall.

All assessment in the province of Ontario will be based on market values starting in 1975.

Prime objective of the reassessment program is to bring equity to the taxation system, said Carl Madgett, assessment director for this area covering Halton, Peel, York, Ontario, Simcoe and Muskoka districts. There are about 417,000 properties in the area with 110 municipalities.

Mr. Madgett told the Brampton news conference that recent programs of assessing property at market value showed everyone is in favor of equity in assessment and taxation provided they don't have to pay more for it.

Mr. Madgett said he received a complaint from one homeowner whose assessment rose from around \$4,000 to nearly \$53,000 under market value assessment. His taxes rose from \$400 to \$1,000.


"That home owner was hopping mad. What he didn't appreciate was that, because of inadequacies in the old assessment system, he had been getting preferred treatment. Other home owners with similar properties worth as much had been paying taxes of close to

"Obviously the other home owners should have been hopping mad on discovering that property owner hadn't been paying his fair share of local taxes in the past," Mr. Madgett declared.

"The program is essential if there is to be any equity in property assessment and local taxation," Madgett continued. "This means some people will pay less in taxes and others more. Unfortunately, we hear from those property owners whose assessment at market value indicates higher taxes. They prefer the old inequitable system which unintentionally concealed the special treatment they were getting."

A homeowner will know expected to take two years. whether his assessment is realistic or not as he likely has a good idea of what his property is worth on the open market the

assessment director said. Who would set the market value of property?


It would be based on the market value set by sales and resales of similar housing in a community. Updating would take place annually.

Asked if there was any relief for people forced out of homes by escalated assessment values, Mr. Madgett said this was not the responsibility of his department. They existed merely to equalize the assessment. However, he pointed out that people over 65 years of age could obtain relief from the Act with a lien against the

Mayor Hazel McCallum of Streetsville contended there were no evictions necessary in Streetsville and pointed out there was often confusion between taxation and assessment. If a municipality does not attempt to raise more money the majority of home owners would pay approximately the same under the new system. The mill rate should drop according to the assessment.

The assessment office will have to juggle two sets of assessments until an entire county is assessed and then switch over to the newer system.
