(Continued from Page 1) Board of Directors in dealing with the situation were effective," said the release.

"As a means of maintaining the stature which the hospital has achieved, and to assist with its further development, certain recommendations were made. In summary, these recommendations are as follows:-

"(a) A review of the committee structure of the governing body and its by-laws be undertaken.

"(b) An administrator and a Director of Nursing be appointed together with such other departmental managers as are required to meet the needs of the hospital.

"(c) Improvements be made in the systems and procedures within each department in order to increase the effectiveness of operations throughout the hospital.

"As a first step in the implementation of the recommendations made in the report, the Board of Directors has appointed Mr. Ronald R. Woods as Administrator of the hospital. Mr. Woods comes to

Milton from the North York General Hospital in Toronto where he held the position of Assistant Administrator," concluded the board's press release.
