Plans were finalized for a spring clean-up campaign across Halton and the Bureau's member fire departments will distributing literature on this subject in the near future.


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
That's the solution Sixth Line resident Peter Bowman offered Esquesing council Monday evening, to the problem of raising money to help build a pavilion for Hornby Park.

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


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
