# Conservation levy \$378,000

Despite efforts to pare 1970 expenditures to a minimum, Halton Region Conservation Authority approved a 1970 budget Thursday that requires levies totalling \$378,000 from its nine member municipalities. The figure is \$100,000 over the 1969 levy—most of the increase due to fixed costs.

The Authority faces a \$130,000 payment on its new Scotch Block dam and reservoir which is now under construction in Esqueving Township. Water conservation and flood control costs were set at \$143,000 which is the major item in the 1969 budget.

Chairman Barry Humphreys, Burlington, said 1970 and 1971 would be "peak years" as far as the Authority's spending is concerned. This year payments begin on the recently acquired Crawford Lake (1970 levy is \$26,093) and the major payment is due this year on the Scotch Block project. Next year the Authority hopes to have its

Hilton Falls dam and reservoir underway and the first year levy on that project will likely be around \$130,000, he explained. In ensuing years the new dams will call for levies about \$30,000 each.

Fixed costs in the levies include administration at \$90,360, maintenance of dams \$3,000, general maintenance \$24,500, the Crawford Lake financing at \$26,093 and a shortage on capital levies from 1969 of \$5,435.

Finance committee chairman Dr. C. A. Martin of Milton was asked to meet with committee chairman and chop \$24,000 from the three remaining areas—office renovations at \$5,000, conservation area budget at \$42,300 and land use budget at \$33,125. Members at Thursday's meeting were unable to decide where to make the cuts.

West Flamborough delegate Max Taylor urged the Authority to reserve some funds this year

to assist his township with a municipal swamp drain project near Millgrove. He claimed the township had never received any help since joining the Authority, and this project had been placed in the budget, then chopped out three years in a row. The municipality is involved in litigation and area residents have presented a petition to have the drain either cleaned out or closed up. Authority members were hopeful the work could be done this year.

Resources Manager Dave Murray explained the total cost to supporting municipalities may be less than \$378,000 this year, depending on the progress of dams and flood control projects undertaken by the water control

committee. If the Authority doesn't have to spend the money this year, the municipalities will not be billed for a portion of their levy, he said.

Municipalities will be responsible for the total levy according to their assessments. Burlington pays 44.28, Oakville 41.28, Milton 3.66, East Flamborough 2.80, Esqueving 2.72, Nassagaweya 2.02, West Flamborough 1.79, Waterdown 1.11 and Puslinch 0.34 per cent of the total levy. For many projects where a local municipality will be the sole benefactor, the Authority pays five per cent of the cost and 95 per cent of the total is assessed against the benefitting municipality.

## Milton Council approves Halton region

Milton Council agreed in principle to regional government for Halton as it now exists, in a two-tier system with five lower tier municipalities.

A resolution was passed Monday by council as direction for representatives to County Council who were expected to face a similar resolution at that level.

Mayor B. Best reported on the Friday morning meeting of County Council with mayors of the municipalities which concluded in general support for a Halton regional government unit including all of Burlington and Nassagaweya.

A resolution containing this proposal was to be presented to the County's Tuesday meeting.

The mayor suggested that if Burlington was to be retained in Halton, support from the individual municipalities was necessary. The Minister of Municipal Affairs, he noted, had promised a decision by May 1 on whether Burlington would become part of Halton or part of Hamilton regions.

"We've been making proposals for two years. No one pays any attention to us", Councillor C. Fay complained.

"The lack of progress can't be

attributed to the Minister. He's done an excellent job in a difficult portfolio", Mayor Best suggested.

"What are we going to get, another county council?" Councillor Charles Fay asked. "If they'd been doing their job and taking the lead like they should have, we'd never be having regional government now", he concluded.

Reeve Harris suggested county council was restricted in its responsibilities. He pointed out the responsibilities proposed for regional government were more extensive.

Deputy Reeve P. Barr suggested early action by Halton would be just taking the "heat" off the legislature. He suggested Halton would be a viable unit without Burlington if necessary.

Mayor Best disagreed. He cited the support for such things as hospital grants and the Manor.

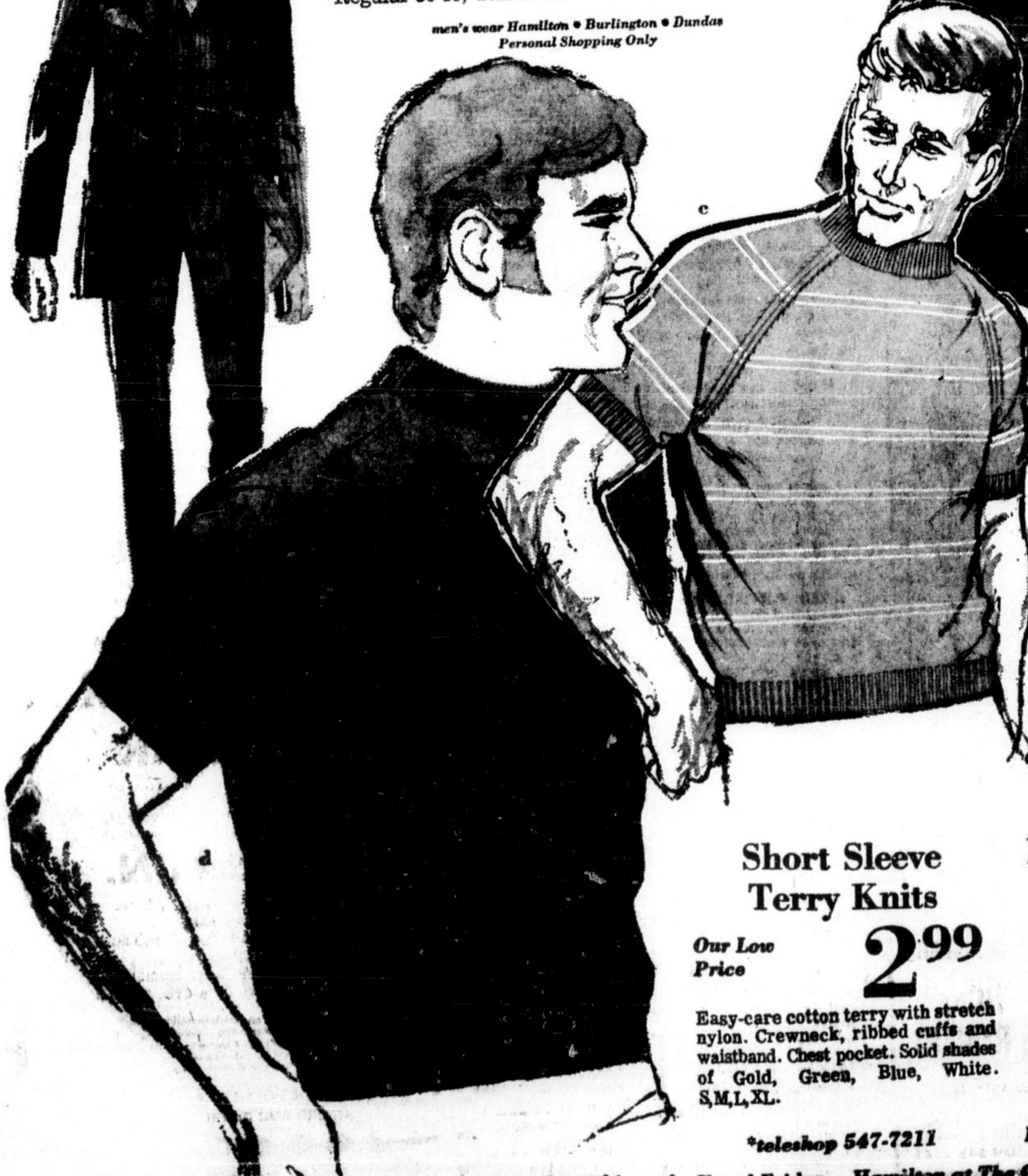

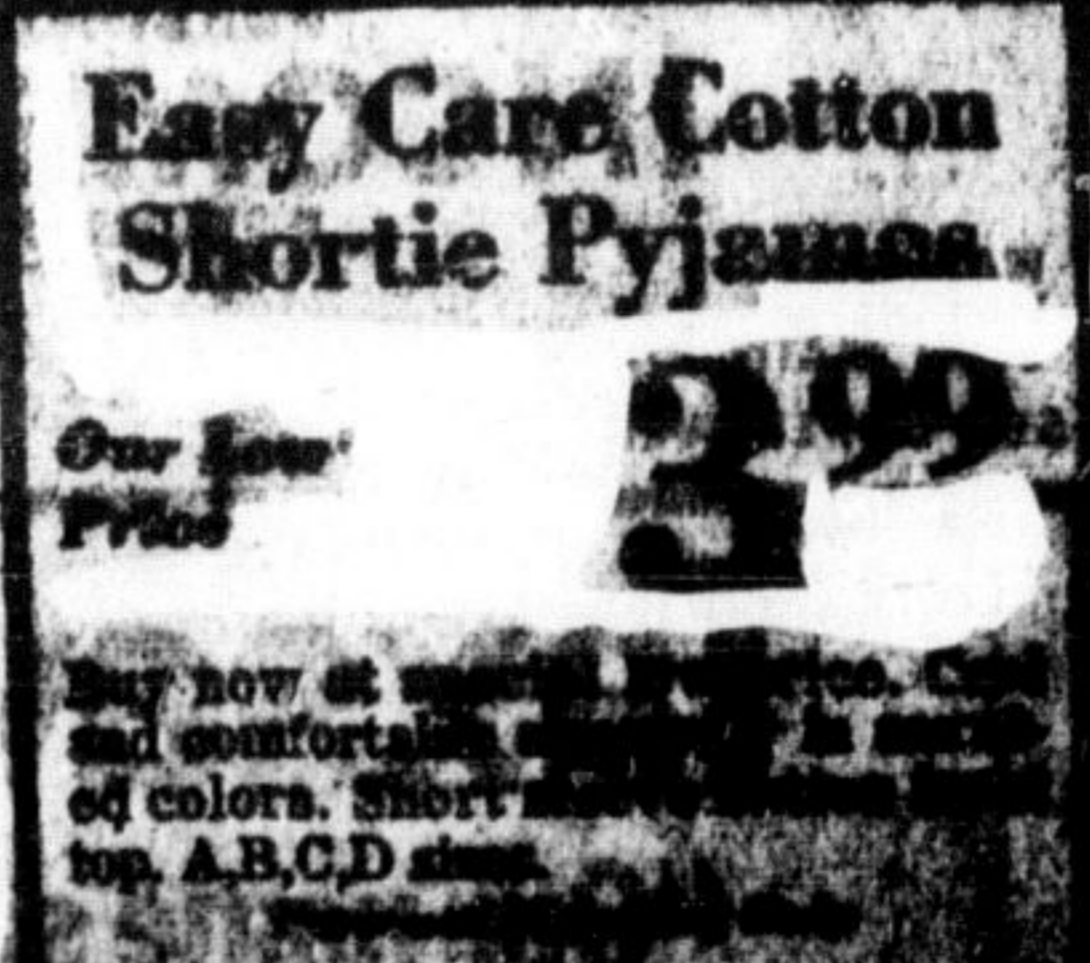
