


Canadian Herve Filion World driving champion

Herve Filion brought the first world harness driving championship home to Canada Sunday in Montreal. Filion, the 30-year-old Canadian champion from Angers, P.Q., defeated seven other contenders from the U.S., Australia, Italy, Austria, New Zealand and West Germany to capture the world championship.

Campbellville's Mohawk Raceway hosted the sixth leg of the seven-leg championship marathon Saturday night and it was a record-breaking night for the track as many old records toppled. Attendance of 11,740, the daily double pool of \$40,622, exactor pool of \$34,279, single race pool of \$55,958 and mutuel handle for the night of \$474,857 were all record-breakers.
