

Canadian Herve Filion world driving champion

Herve Filion brought the first world harness driving championship home to Canada Sunday in Montreal. Filion, the 30-year-old Canadian champion from Angers, P.Q., defeated seven other contenders from the U.S., Australia, Italy, Austria, New Zealand and West Germany to capture the world championship.

Campbellville's Mohawk Raceway hosted the sixth leg of the seven-leg championship marathon Saturday night and it was a record-breaking night for the track as many old records toppled. Attendance of 11,740, the daily double pool of \$40,622, exactor pool of \$34,279, single race pool of \$55,958 and mutual handle for the night of \$474,857 were all record-breakers.

The international drivers made it a big night at Mohawk Saturday as they drove local

horses in the fourth, fifth, seventh and eighth races. Their wide-open style had the record crowd on their feet often.

Filion had piled up 474 points for the world championship by the time Sunday's races at Blue Bonnets in Montreal were over—but it took a ninth race, clutch victory to end up atop the pile. George Sholty of U.S. was second with 418, Stanley Dancer of U.S. third with 392, Kevin Newman of Australia fourth with 298, Peter Wolfenden of New Zealand fifth with 285, Nello Bellei of Italy sixth with 288, Ernst Fischer of Austria seventh with 278 and Eddy Freundt of Germany eighth with 138.

Freundt and Wolfenden has appeared at Mohawk Inn last Wednesday for a press conference in advance of the Mohawk Raceway leg of their tour. Both reported harness driving was a little different in North America than back home but they were all enjoying the competition immensely. Fischer was the biggest point winner at

the Saturday races with a win, a third, a fourth and a fifth place finish for 75 points.

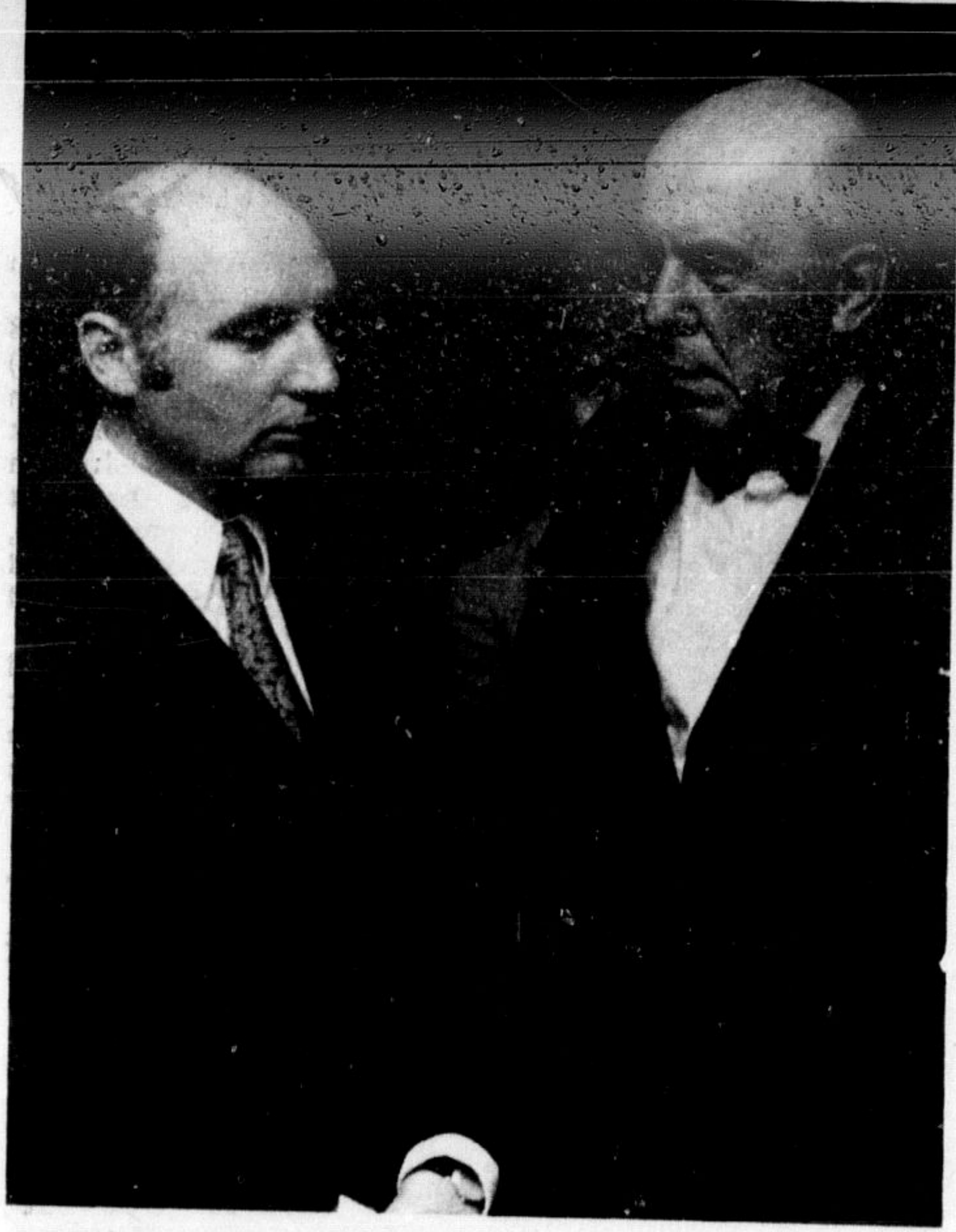

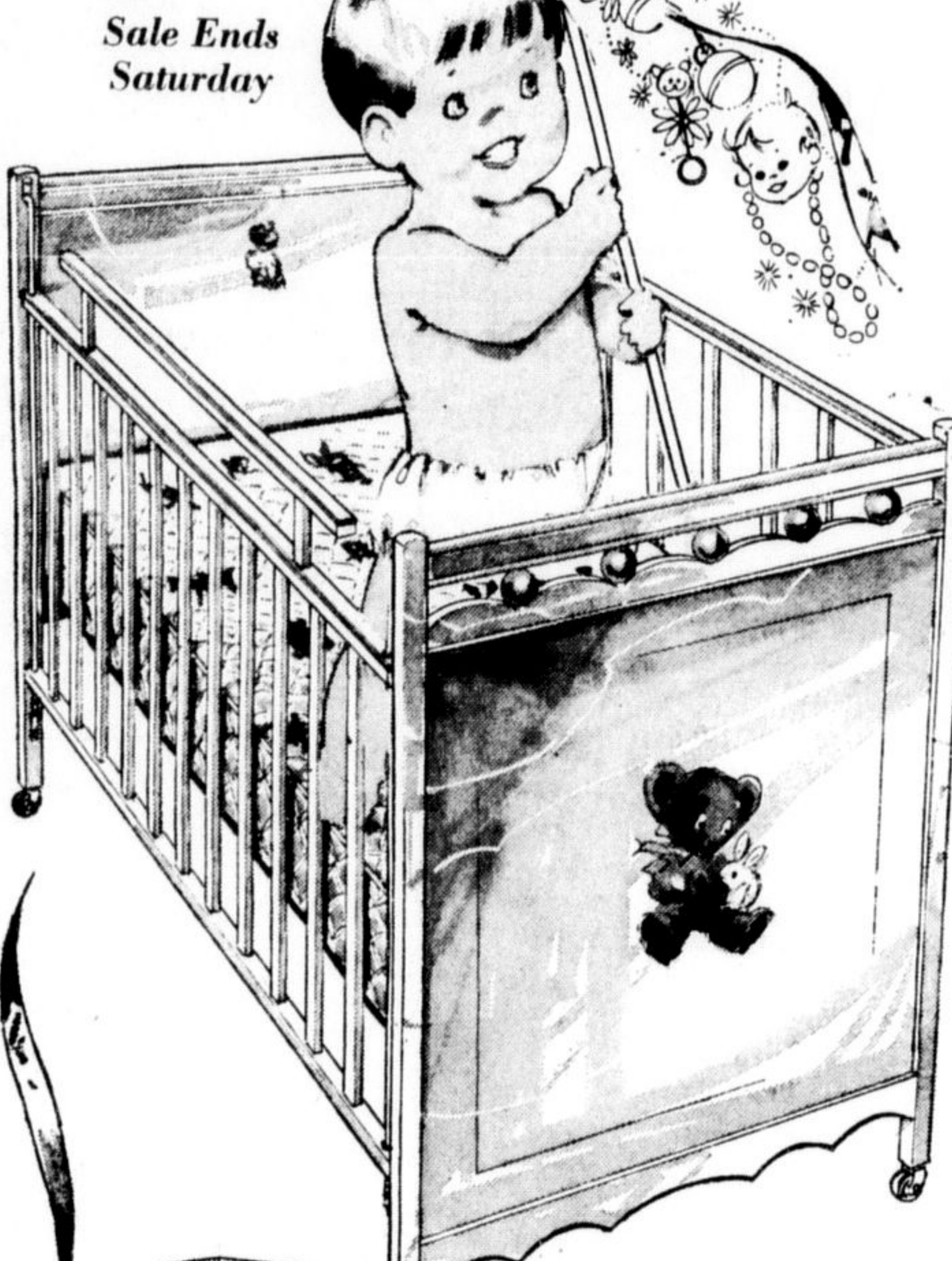
Deputy Reeve Gordon Agnew noted there were more cars parked outside the Conservation Area than there were inside.

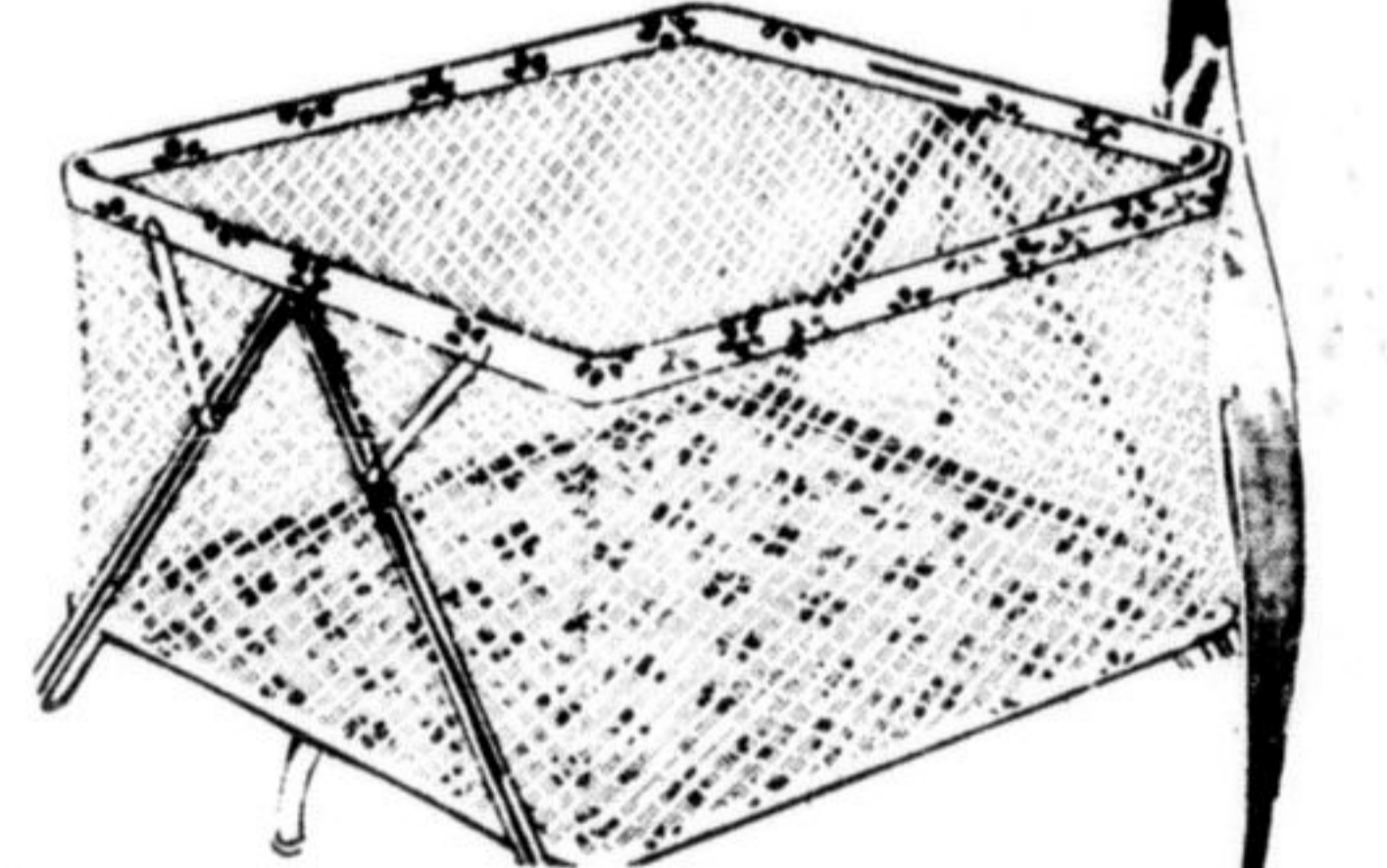
