Firefighters Vaughan, Tight retire honored for 68 years of service

Two Milton firefighters with a total of 68 years of firefighting experience were highly commended for their service and presented with retirement awards Saturday, at a dinner and dance at Milton Fire Hall.

George Vaughan, who retired this year after 40 years of service and Bill Tight who retired after 28 years of firefighting, were guests of honor at a dinner attended by about 75 fellow firefighters, members of Milton Council and members of the Milton Fire Area Committee which administers the brigade.

Fire Chief A. E. Clement pointed out Mr. Vaughan holds the record for long service, according to fire department statistics.

Deputy Chief George Bundy

presented each of the men with an engraved wooden clock bearing their cap badge, plus an engraved copper stein. Mayor Brian Best presented certificates of service on behalf of the council and the citizens of Milton. Mrs. C. May, president of the Ladies Auxiliary presented a gift to each of their wives and Capt. Wilf Penson presented flowers from the head table to Mrs. Vaughan and Mrs. Tight.

Chief Clement said it was "a night tinged with sadness" as the two firefighters retire from active service. "These men have given much to their community and much of their work has been unseen—they have given their best because they were

concerned with the lives of children and adults," he said.

He said both were born and raised in Milton. Mr. Vaughan worked in local stores, delivered bread for a local bakery with a Model T Ford, and has more recently worked at Avro and Milton Brick. He was active in softball, junior and intermediate hockey for many years. He joined the brigade in 1929 and had served as both a lieutenant and captain of the brigade as well as delegate to conventions.

Mr. Tight is a licensed mechanic and has worked in several garages around Milton. He used to play in the citizens band. He joined the brigade in 1941 and had also served as lieutenant and captain and delegate to several firefighters' conventions.

Mr. and Mrs. Vaughan were celebrating their 39th wedding anniversary on Saturday, the night of the dinner in their honor. Mr. and Mrs. Tight will celebrate their 40th anniversary this summer. Both ladies have been active in the Ladies Auxiliary and Chief Clement praised the women for their support and co-operation over the years.

Oakville Councillor Donald Gordon, chairman of the Fire Area Committee, added his praise to the two retiring men and thanked the entire brigade for their continuing good service. Former Chief William Randall also poked and praised the two men for "very dedicated services".

Members of the Milton Lawn Bowling Club catered to the roast beef dinner. A dance followed with music supplied by Fred Timbers.



REPORT

During the week ending April 11 officers of the Milton Detachment, Ontario Provincial Police worked a total of 1046½ hours and patrolled 10,322 miles on area roads. Driving infractions resulted in charges being laid against 36 motorists, while an additional 46 were warned about their driving habits. Proceedings in Provincial Court in Milton led to 51 convictions being registered.

Officers were called upon to investigate 35 general occurrences this week, including two thefts, one of which involved a motor vehicle, which was recovered later, with the arrest of two persons, two breaking and entering investigations, one disturbance, three investigations under the Liquor Control Act lead to charges against five persons and three stolen cars were recovered for other Police Detachments. There was one missing person complaint, one assault, one fraud, and one person was charged under the Petty Trespass Act. One premise was found insecure by an officer on night patrol. Other complaints were of a minor nature, requiring little investigative time.

During the week 16 motor vehicle accidents were reported for investigation; of this number nine resulted in property damage only; while 11 persons sustained injuries in the remaining mishaps. Total property damage was estimated at approximately \$36,325. The collisions were

attributed to: careless driving, fail to yield right of way, fail to signal, improper passing, cutting in, mechanical failure and deer on road.

Upon completion of investigations 11 motorists were charged with various offences under the Highway Traffic Act.

This week Provincial Constable T. R. Penrice of Milton OPP spoke to classes at the Georgetown Christian School, Norval Public School and Brookville Public School, stressing the importance of bicycle safety.

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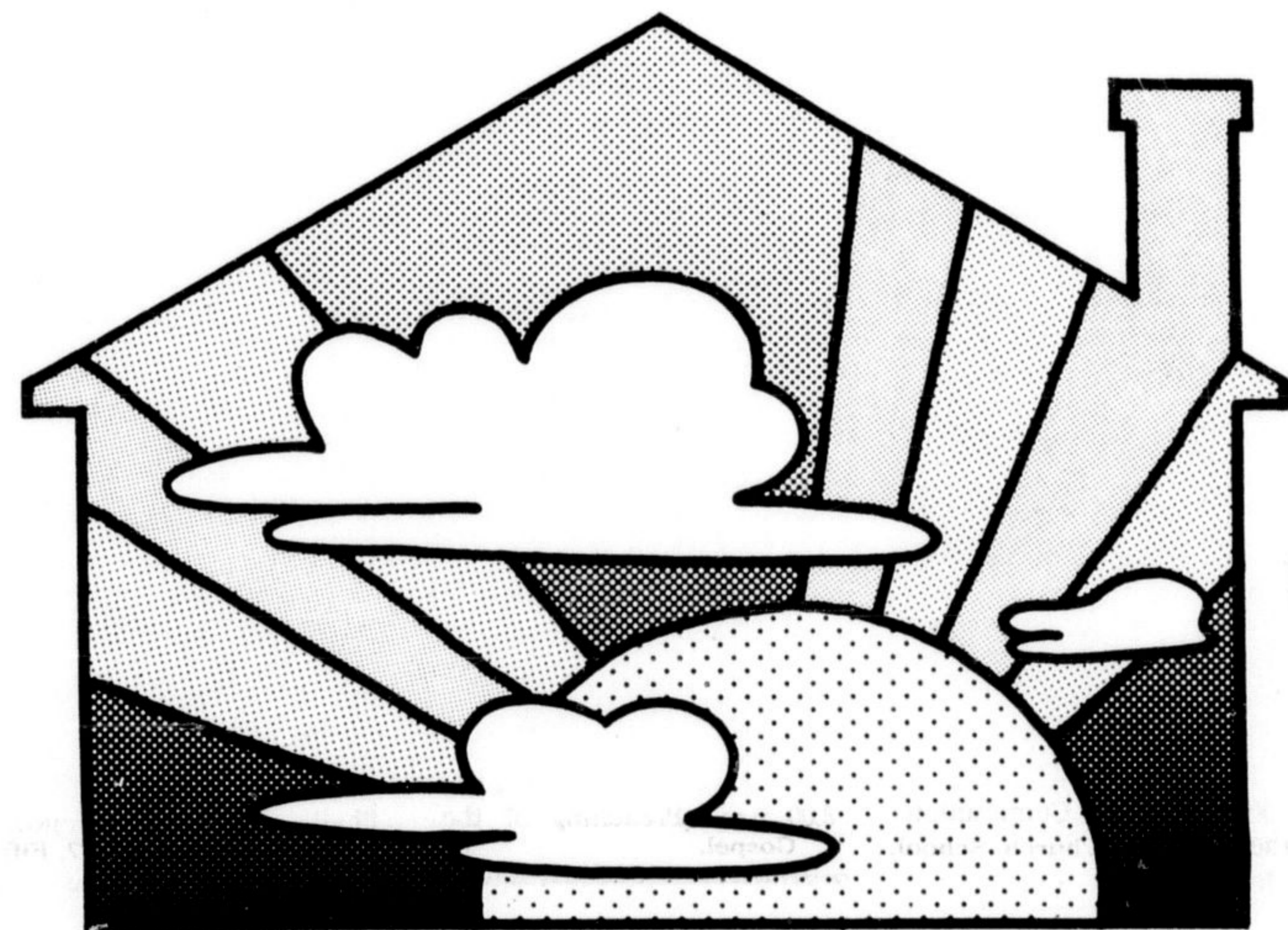
PROCLAMATION DAYLIGHT SAVING TIME IN MILTON
