

# Grand slam in first inning gives Campbellville victory

A seven run rally in the first inning sparked by a grand slam homer by veteran George Chester gave Campbellville Merchants an 8-5 win over Waterdown Tigers in their first game of the Halton County Intermediate Baseball League in Campbellville Sunday.

In the ninth inning with the Merchants leading 8-2, two out and men on first and second Campbellville coach Earl Cairns pulled pitcher Garney Mitchell and brought veteran hurler

Harry Hamilton in to dispense with the last batter.

Cairns knew Mitchell was tired and rather than make him face Lockington, Waterdown's big hitter, he put Hamilton in with the idea that he could walk him rather than give something too good and then go for Micky Bailey, next in the lineup.

The move proved costly as Hamilton had trouble finding the range and walked the first batters he faced and was tagged with a single from Phillips and

then walked Dave Thompson to score three runs in that inning before fanning Larry King.

With the exception of the first inning the Campbellville offense wasn't potent. After the first inning the Merchants never really threatened except for a one run rally in the fifth inning.

Doug Lang, the first man to face Neil Dodman in the game opened with a double. Dodman hit Elmer Dredge, walked Ken Moore, hit Larry McPhail and then let the wrong one go.

Chester was there waiting and sent it out of the park into deep left field, scoring four runs and sending the Merchants ahead 5-1. Lorris Faggion singled and Bill Currie walked in the first and both eventually scored.

The only other Campbellville run came in the fifth when McPhail scored after he doubled and was knocked in on a fielder's choice by Faggion.

Waterdown opened in the first with one when Gary Summerfield walked and scored on Lockington's double. Mitchell held them scoreless until the seventh inning when Larry King walked and scored on singles by Rick Repta and A. Wilson.

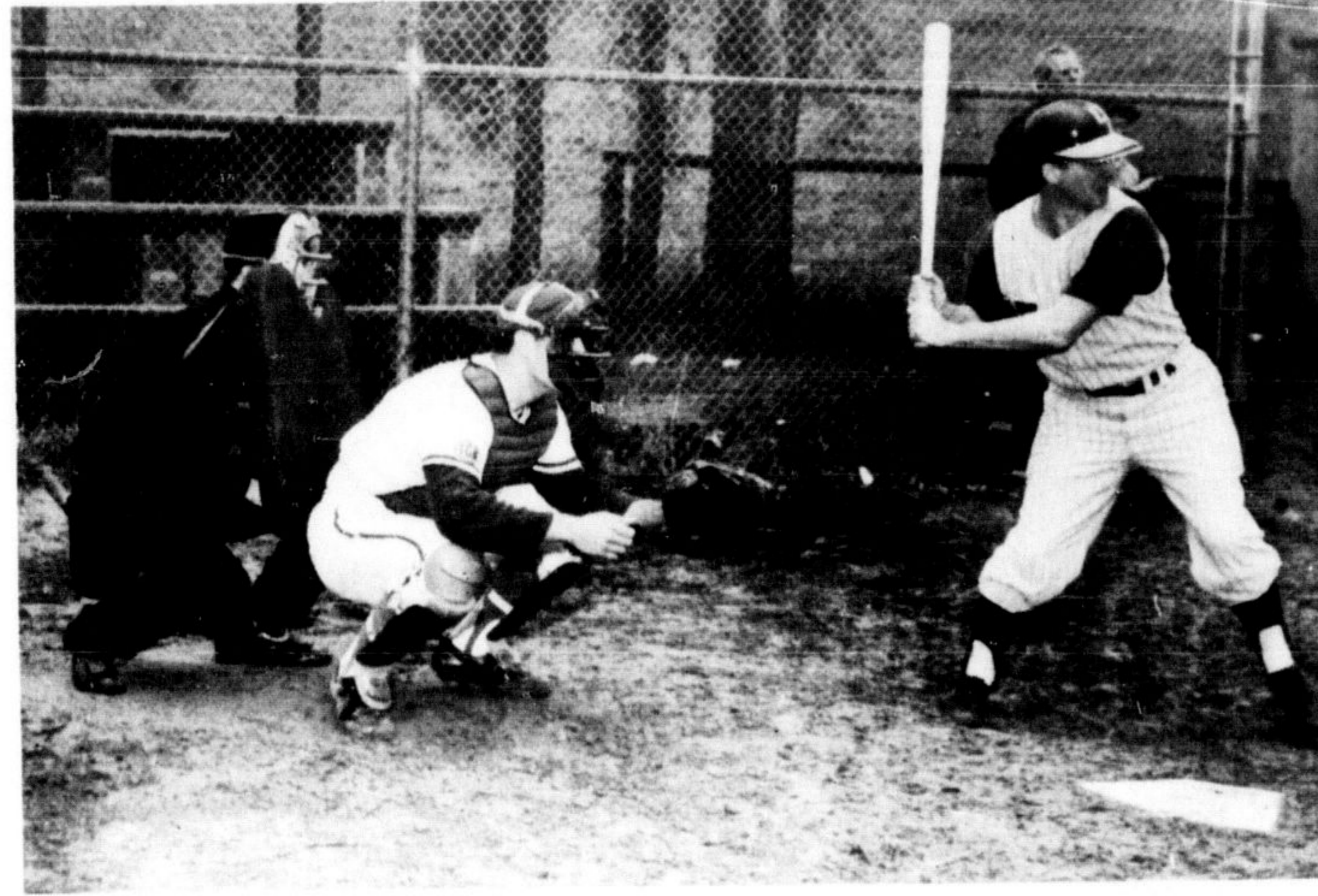
While coach Earl Cairns expressed certain disenchantment with the Campbellville boys at bat, he was pleased with the defensive performance and said Mitchell pitched a great game.

In eight and two third innings Mitchell gave up seven hits, issued seven free passes and fanned five Waterdown batters. His infield made one error behind him. In one third of an inning Harry Hamilton gave up three walks, allowed one hit and struck out one batter.

Going the distance for Waterdown, Neil Dodman allowed seven hits, hit three batters, walked two and fanned six. There were no errors charged to his fielders.

Big hitters for Campbellville were Doug Lang with a double and single, McPhail with a pair of doubles and Chester with a homer. Faggion, and Elmer Dredge singled.

Campbellville was to have started in Hamilton Wednesday but the game was rained out. They are scheduled to visit Georgetown Wednesday and then host the league power Leaside Maple Leafs.

# Big meet draws near O.S.D. athletes prepare

Werner Zaulnieter will be among the Junior boys at O.S.D. who will be working on an intensified track program to get in number one shape for the International games for the Deaf, Ontario schools from Milton and Belleville and American schools from Flint Michigan and Rome New York will compete.

Zaulnieter won the junior mile event in a recent meet against Perdue High School, running 5:26.2. He has run better times, as low as 5:00 even for the mile, and physical education instructor Lindsay Moir is confident he'll improve with the season and could run the mile in 4.40 or 4.50 at his best performance.

While the O.S.D. officials will be looking for great things from the youngster in the mile he will be bringing points home for the high jump, 880, long jump or any or all of these events. Zaulnieter rates as one of the topnotch deaf athletes at the school.

Allan Bowers in his first year as a junior has proven himself as a good sprinter and an excellent hurdler and good in the long jump. "He can be counted on to place in almost any event," says Moir.

At five feet nine inches Bert Day will see action in events usually reserved for big men. Moir explains Day's attribute with the discus and shot put is more in a well co-ordinated body rather than brute size or strength.

Dave Griffiths of Milton is expected to compete in the shot put event. Linda Russell, who competed in the Deaf Olympics in Yugoslavia last year is probably the outstanding junior girl at O.S.D. Linda is not consistent in her times but is often just a step better than whoever comes second.

# Track meet Thursday

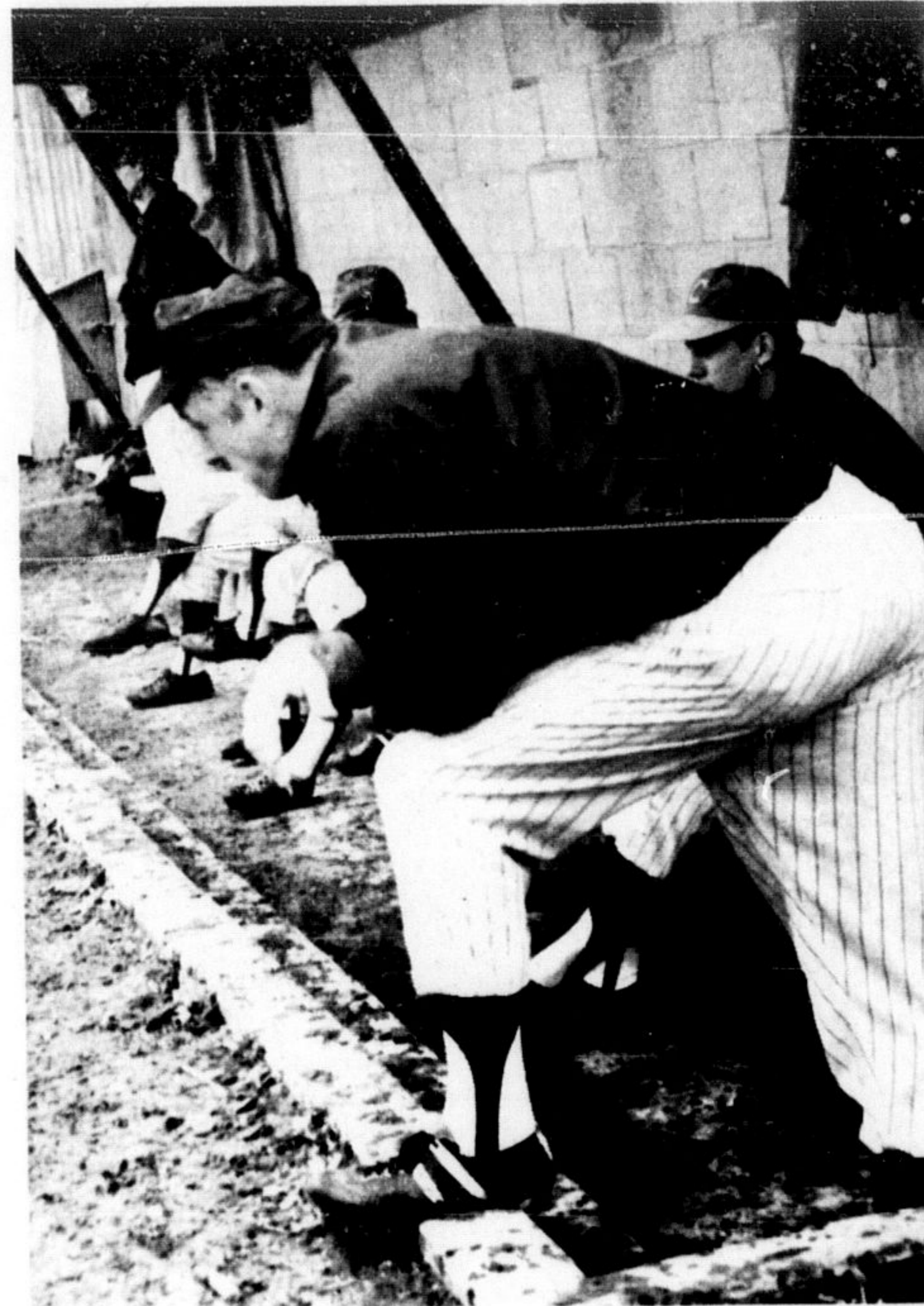
Martin St. track and field athletes will compete amongst themselves Thursday at Milton District High School with their school meeting getting underway at 1 p.m.
