Special mention should be given to the trumpet soloist and in particular to the young lady who made the percussion section of the band sparkle. The star of the evening would have to be John Chong whose brilliant piano solo brought a hush of admiration from the audience.

Perhaps our educational program should be placing more emphasis on this type of group training as opposed to limited participation spectator sports. After last Tuesday's program, I am convinced that it should be so.
