Senior citizen apartment approved by Milton Committee of Adjustment

Despite recent objections the site was too far away from the downtown area, an application for approval of Milton's senior citizens apartment project was approved with virtually no objections at a hearing of Milton Committee of Adjustment on Wednesday.

George Wimpey (Canada) Limited, Toronto, applied to convey a parcel on the east side of Ontario St. N., with 289 feet frontage and an average depty of 150 feet, to be used for a senior citizens home. It was passed unanimously by the five-man Committee of Adjustment, on the condition the company dedicate a 17 foot strip of frontage to the town for future road widening purposes.

Wimpey will turn the site over to Ontario Housing Corporation and build a 36-unit, four storey apartment building on the land. The Wimpey bid of \$364,392 for the land and construction of the apartments was the lowest of three submitted.

Oakville and District Labor Council and a group of concerned local citizens recently circulated a petition objecting to the Ontario St. N. Site. The petition, bearing 1,000 names,

has been submitted to Halton East MPP Jim Snow, a member of the OHC. Milton Senior Citizens Club had also opposed the site but when it learned last week that many of its members were desperate for accommodations, they withdrew their protest.

Only person speaking at Wednesday's hearing was Harold Robinson, a solicitor for Chabert Investments Ltd. which owns the Bubble Bath Laboratories building next door to the apartment site. While not objecting to the senior citizens home, Mr. Robinson expressed concern that further building in that area will increase the flow in the creek which is already causing an erosion problem at the rear of the Bubble Bath

But Don Ennis, an engineer for Wimpey's who appeared with the application, said the Wimpey firm has an easement across its property and plans to carry all the drainage water from its proposed subdivision east of Ontario St. to the Sixteen Mile Creek. He predicted this would leave the drainage ditch at Bubble Bath "basically dry" and


