Campbellville blanks Preston Mitchell registers second win

Campbellville defeated Preston 4-0 in Campbellville on Sunday afternoon to make their season's record thus far three wins against one loss.

Garnet Mitchell went all the way for Campbellville as he chalked up his second win of the year. He limited Preston to three scattered singles as he struck out nine and walked three. Spike Coughlin did the hurling for

Preston and he too went the route allowing four runs off 10 hits. He struck out four and hit two batters.

Campbellville opened the scoring in the fourth inning on a disputed call by the umpire. Dredge singled and was stealing second when Chester hit to the shortstop's right. The shortstop momentarily juggled the ball and then looked to second but

Dredge had already reached that base so he went to first and overthrew the base, the ball going out of play. The plate umpire waved Dredge home but Preston protested that he was only entitled to third base. Campbellville came right back with another in the fifth as Don Hearn opened the inning with a home run over the right field fence.

In the sixth a single by Chester, Faggion's double and a single by Moore produced another run to make it 3-0 and in the eighth Chester again singled and was doubled home by Faggion to complete the scoring at 4-0.

Gillow, Ortwein and Braithwaite all singled for Preston. George Chester with three singles led the Campbellville attack. Loris Faggion doubled twice, Elmer Dredge singled twice, Don Hearn homered and Doug Lang and Ken Moore both singled.

FOOTNOTES: It was a big day for Don Hearn who played his first full game for Campbellville, got his first hit, and his first home run.

Rick Clement made a great play in the second when he made a catch in deep right and nailed Ortwein at third as he tried to go from second after the catch.

Campbellville pulled off a neat double play in the eighth as the play went from Dredge to Faggion to McPhail.

Oakville was actually scheduled in but because of other commitments, Campbellville allowed them to switch games with Preston. Campbellville now has two tough encounters coming up. Tonight (Wed.) they go to Leaside to meet last year's champions and on Sunday, June 7 at 2:30 p.m. in Campbellville they meet this year's league leaders, the undefeated Oakville Oaks.

Lowville still unbeaten in four league games

Lowville extended their unbeaten streak to four games with two wins in the Burlington-Halton Rural Softball League but lost to Pyett's, the first place team from the Hamilton Big Four League in the past week's action.

Tuesday evening of last week Lowville knocked Parkland Paving 5-3 in a league game with Lee Coulson the winning pitcher. Coulson gave up three runs on six hits, struck out three and issued no walks in 5 1/3

innings. Jacques Paquette in relief hurled 3 2/3 innings, allowing one hit, fanning nine batters and issuing no walks.

Lowville's bats collected eight hits off Parkland's Dave Sehweyer. Mark Buck and Lee Coulson had a pair of singles apiece, Murray Dawson tripled, Stu King doubled, Bruce Carver and Doug Coverdale each singled. For Parkland, Doug Donovan doubled and singled for three of their seven hits. Lowville was ahead 4-0 before Parkland scored twice in the fifth and added their final run in the sixth. The winners' final run came in the eighth.

Coulson went the distance and gave up four hits, struck out 11 and walked two as Lowville beat Omagh 4-2 on Friday. Both teams played errorless ball and Lowville batters got to Omagh hurler Al Few for eight hits although he fanned 15.

Doug Powell led the winning attack with a double and single while Dennis Sinclair singled twice, Frank Bertasson homered, and Stu King, Bruce Carver and Doug Coverdale all singled once. Lowville collected one run in the

first, two in the second, and one in the eighth. Both Omagh runs came in the third inning.

In the exhibition game Pyett's took an early lead and held it to win 9-4, collecting 15 hits off the Lowville mound staff. Gino Mariutti knocked out two homers and two singles, Dick Boshier a homer and a single to lead the Hamilton club to victory.

Lowville's eight hits included a homer and two singles for Doug Coverdale, a double and single each for Stu King and Stu Dolbel and a single by Bruce Carver.

Coulson was the losing pitcher.

This week's action sees Lowville at home to Leggats on Friday and Procor on Tuesday.
