The Bible, to be located on the communion table, was the gift of the Rev. and Mrs. George Kelly and family of Toronto. Mrs. Kelly and members of the family were present for the dedication.

Rev. Kelly was minister at the Lowville-Zimmerman United Church from 1930 to 1936 and a close neighbor and friend of Mr. Harbottle. He recently retired after several years of service with Manor Rd. United Church in Toronto.

The stand for the Bible was given by Mrs. F. W. Harbottle. Clerk of Session W. L. McNeil made the presentation which was accepted by Rev. C. Hainer on behalf of St. Paul's.



## REPORT

During the week of June 14 to 20 officers of the Ontario Provincial Police stationed at Milton worked a total of 993 hours and patrolled 10,242 miles on area roads. Charges were laid against 14 persons for traffic violations and an additional 15 other motorists received warnings. Convictions were registered against 207 persons in Provincial Court, Milton.

Officers investigated 38 general occurrences during this time period including one complaint of trespassers, two domestic complaints, five investigations under the Liquor Control Act resulted in charges being laid against 11 persons, one stolen car was recovered, one missing person located, one premise was found insecure by an officer on night patrol, eight thefts, one of which included a motor vehicle and four break and enters.

At the end of the seven day period Milton Detachment recorded 11 accidents. Eight of these resulted in property damage only while four persons sustained injuries in the remaining three accidents. Damage amounted to ap-

proximately \$8,700. The accidents resulted from careless driving, following too closely, inattentive driving, impaired driving and improper turns. As a result of an accident a pony received injuries. Following investigations 11 persons were summoned for court appearances.
